BARTLETT'S ARE NEARLY GONE

Fall Pears in California Show Splendid Quality, But Are Coming Forward For Shipment To The East Very Slowly. The California Fruit Distributors under date of Sept. 16, say: The following gives the number of cars of deciduous fruit shipped from all points in California for the week (7 days) ending Friday morning, September 15, 1911. Pears, 38 1/2 cars. This shipment was made up principally of Salways, with a few Clings. Placer county is now practically done with both varieties. There are still a few Salways left in one or two sections, but probably there will not be more than 25 carloads of them altogether. The movement therefore is practically concluded for the season. Plums, 11 3-4 cars. This shipment is just about one-half that of the previous week. There are very few plums left, and it is likely that the coming week will see their finish. Pears, 65 1/2 cars. Bartlett's are now nearly gone. Fall and winter years are coming forward slowly, but will be in greater evidence the next two weeks. Fall pears are of unusually good quality.
