No action was taken by the council. Here is the protest:

Medford, Oregon, Sept. 18, 1911.

We, the undersigned, a committee of the Central Labor Council, duly elected, do hereby protest to your honorable body against your city police protecting railroad property, namely: the searching of and taking from box cars and other railroad property unemployed men who are passing through this city in search of work, and we further protest against the working of said men on public work.

A meeting of the city council was held last night. Those present were Mayor Canon, Councilmen Eberhart, Miller, Watt and Merrick. Absent, Smerick and Wortman.

An ordinance was passed authorizing the levying of an assessment for paving on North Fir street, Newtown street, Roosevelt avenue, Sherman street, Minnesota avenue and Washington street.

An ordinance was passed directing that the Clark-Henry company be given contract for paving Third, Fifth and Grape streets and the alleys in the Mall Tribune and Moore hotel blocks.

The Jacobson-Bade company were given contract to lay water mains on South Riverside and South Holly streets. These are extensive lines and all are to be laid in those sections recently taken into the city.

A petition was presented from property owners in the Imperial addition asking for street lights at the corner of Tenth street and Vancouver avenue. Referred to light committee. Cement sidewalks were ordered put in from Second street to Jackson boulevard, and on Rose avenue from Second to Fourth streets.

Ordinance was passed authorizing the sale of \$34,750 of street improvement bonds.

The application of J. W. Slinger for liquor license was approved and license ordered issued.
