The district has the reputation of being pockety, because many minerhave covered it in search only of the rich spots. These are occasionally found-nearly always in the poi phyry. But these miners overlooked or ignored the real permanent source of revenue the great porphyry dikes with their disseminations of gold to profitable quantities. It is a mamoth milling proposition. This fact now taking bold and the near futurshould witness many hig companies operating in various parts of the extensive district.


