

SALT LAKE IS TOLD OF MINES

C. C. Inman Returns To Salt Lake City And Reports Revival Of This District—Is Now Forming Company—Has 500 Acres Here.

(Herald, Salt Lake City.) Southwestern Oregon, embracing a great block of ground 200x250 miles running from the ocean beach back into Jackson, Josephine and Curry counties in the vicinity of Medford and Grant's Pass, is credited with a placer production since 1849 of \$130,000,000, according to C. C. Inman, a well known Goldfield (Nev.) mining man and concentrator inventor who has returned from a trip over the Oregon country where he secured options on nearly 500 acres of desirable gold ground.

Mr. Inman reports that the revival of this old district is now on, and that small outfits may be found in most every canyon either hunting the rich gold pockets, washing sands in the stream beds, or developing some of the pronounced lodes which cut through the country. He went over one great mineralized porphyry dikes which outcrops for a distance of between one and two miles and is 1000 feet in width from wall to wall which he fully believes will assay across the width an average of \$3.50 a ton. The gold is disseminated all through this intrusive. The estimated cost of handling the ore is placed by Mr. Inman at 15 to 20 cents a ton, as there are at hand ample water and every other essential to cheap treatment.

The Rogue river runs through that section, and with its tributaries furnishes unlimited water for hydraulic mining. Near the Pacific coast, some table lands run up 1000 feet high the ground being all worth washing. As none of the streams are navigable the tailings can be handled cheaply. Occasionally some chunks of ore, almost nuggets, are found which are immensely rich. Mr. Inman saw one not much bigger than a man's fist which carried \$500 in gold.

The district has the reputation of being pocket, because many miners have covered it in search only of the rich spots. These are occasionally found—nearly always in the porphyry. But these miners overlooked or ignored the real permanent source of revenue the great porphyry dikes with their disseminations of gold in profitable quantities. It is a mammoth milling proposition. This fact is now taking hold and the near future should witness many big companies operating in various parts of the extensive district.

Mr. Inman and Salt Lake associates are now organizing the Automatic Separator Placer Mining company. The object is to manufacture in this city the Inman separator. One of these 100-ton mills will cost about \$1,000.

WOOL GROWERS ARE AFTER RATES

Another Found in Fight Starts—Commissioner Prouty is Holding Hearing At Portland—Appealed For Relief in 1909.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 27.—Another round in the fight of Eastern Oregon, Washington and Idaho wool growers to secure lower and generally more favorable rates on wool to the east was fought before Examiner Prouty for the inter-state commerce commission in the federal building yesterday.

Rates on wool from the west to Missouri river and eastern points have been unsatisfactory to wool growers for some years. Oregon growers appealed to the state railroad commission for relief in October 1909, and the commission began an investigation which was finally taken up by the inter-state commerce commission and consolidated with a great number of complaints from wool growers throughout the west, from Canada to Mexico.

THINKS WOMAN GUILTY OF BRUTAL MURDER

COLORADO SPRINGS, Col., Sept. 27.—Declaring that women when aroused, are more brutal than men, and that there are not twenty men in the country inhuman enough to have committed the gasty sextuple murder which for days has been a mystery here, Detective J. W. Erb, of the Pinkerton agency, today set his men to work seeking for a woman, whom he says butchered the Wayne and Burnham families with an axe.

Jealousy is the only motive considered by the detectives. Detective Pretzman, who has charge of the Pinkertons who are investigating the case, claims that he is in possession of information which promises some startling developments within the next few days. He believes that the case centers about Wayne's relations with an unknown woman prior to his wife's arrival here three weeks before the tragedy.

GRANGE, UNIONS, FARMERS, FAVOR RECALL JUDGES

NORTH YAKIMA, Wn., Sept. 27.—The convention of the state grange state federation of labor, direct legislation and the farmers union, in session here today has adopted a resolution endorsing the movement for the passage of an amendment to the state constitution providing for the recall of judges. The resolution was adopted after a hot debate lasting over two hours.

STORM SEWER ON NINTH STREET

Street Commissioner Baker Has Large Force Of Men At Work—Will Furnish Drainage To Large Area.

Street Commissioner Baker has a gang of about twenty men at work putting in a storm sewer on Ninth street.

The sewer stands at the Southern Pacific railroad track and runs west on Ninth street to the alley between Hally and Ivy streets, then south to Eleventh street and then west to Oakdale avenue.

It is quite probable that several laterals will be put in to connect with this main line, these to go in different directions from Oakdale.

This storm sewer is intended to carry off all of the surface water from the southwest portion of the city which was so troublesome to residents last winter and which in many places flooded the sanitary sewer.
