

ENYART WINS TROPHY SHOOT

Gets Second Leg on Mail Tribune Loving Cup—Splendid Day's Sport Is Had—Eugene Wins High Mark In Contest

J. E. Enyart won the shoot among local men Friday for the loving cup presented four years ago by the Mail Tribune to the Medford Rod and Gun club as a trophy. This is the second time Mr. Enyart has won, three times being necessary to gain ownership of the cup. Other shooters winning in previous years have been L. B. Minard, Claude Miles and Dr. Seely.

The professional loving cup was won by Frank Riehl of Tacoma. Frank Riehl beat his Thursday's score of 101 out of a possible 105, by four birds. Only once in the five events did he miss.

The prizes for the amateur shots were also awarded. Eugene took first and second places, Medford third and Ashland fourth. Dr. M. M. Bull of Eugene, was the fortunate one, seconded by F. C. Moullen of the same town. W. W. Humphrey took third and O. O. Hellman of Ashland took the last money. W. W. Humphrey won the scholarship prize in competition with all shots from Jackson county.

MISS CLEMENS IS VICTIMIZED

Portland Girl, Formerly Circulation Manager of the Mail Tribune, Loses Her Money—Friends in Portland Come to Her Aid.

Much interest is being taken here in the reports that Miss Mildred Clemens of Portland, formerly circulation manager of the Medford Mail Tribune, who is beginning her freshman year at the University of California, has been swindled out of \$248, all the money she had saved for her year's work by a man who promised to make \$150 more out of it in three days.

Immediate investigation showed that B. F. Signer, the name signed to two worthless checks given to the girl in return for her money, is that of a convict who had been out of San Quentin penitentiary on parole, but was put back by the state board of pardons last week when it was discovered that he had taken up again the game of forgery for which he was committed.

Signer now is serving the remaining six years of his original seven-year sentence, which he received for forging two checks of \$400,000 each with the name of James A. Murray, a millionaire lumberman, who lives at Monterey.

Signer, when released, committed various forgeries and went to board in Berkeley at the house where Miss Clemens lived and, winning from her the story of her struggles for an education, got her money. When the girl found that the checks were worthless, she was forced to ask aid and advice from the university authorities.

As soon as word of the robbery reached Portland, Miss Clemens' friends started a subscription to make up the money that Miss Clemens may realize the ambition of her life for which she has been working night and day for two years.

Mrs. A. J. Renshaw, mother of Miss Clemens lives at 1555 Minerva street, near St. Johns. Miss Clemens is a distant relative of Mark Twain. Her father, William Clemens, was second cousin of the famous humorist.

MISS BROWN WAS PLEASING

Not Only Possesses Beautiful Voice But Displays Vivid Imagination and Keen Intellect as Well—Audience Pleased

4—MISS (By Jeanne Lanetot Brackinreed) Grace Josephine Brown not only possesses a beautiful voice, but a vivid imagination and keen intellect as well—three indispensable requisites for the making of a finished artist—and these qualities Miss Brown displayed last evening at the Medford theatre, in the rendition of her program, "An Evening of Song."

"A Perfect Day" was the first and by far one of the most pleasing numbers. It was sung with such warmth of expression and with enunciation so perfect that no beauty of the song was lost to her audience.

In the second group, "Melisande in the Wood" furnished the singer the opportunity which alone was needed to convince her audience of the dramatic and powerful quality of her voice; this song, picturing as it does one of the most striking scenes in Maeterlinck's great play, "Pelleas and Melisande," was perfectly adapted to the bringing out of the full possibilities of her beautiful contralto.

The Stevenson numbers showed great delicacy of interpretation, and rippled and frolicked in the most fascinating manner.

The last and crowning feature of the evening was the group of four Indian songs by Charles Wakefield Cadman. Miss Brown appeared in Indian costume and made a very attractive and striking picture against the background of tepee and campfire. The melodies themselves, colored as they are by the pensive and brooding nature of the redmen, were rendered by the singer in a very effective manner, giving her an opportunity of displaying, as she did, emotional vocalization of a very high order.
