TO ARREST MAN AT PRISON GATE

When Harry Davis Walks Forth from Penitentiary October 6 He Will be Immediately Re-arrested on Second Charge.

Constable Singler will leave Medford Tuesday for Salem to serve a warrant of arrest on Harry Davis for forgery.

Davis, on October 6th, will have served a two years' term in the penitentiary for a forgery committed in Jackson county.

There was another forgery committed in Medford by Davis at the time the one was committed for which he was convicted, but this second one did not come to light until after he had been sentenced for the first offense. Warner, Wortman & Gore were the victims of the last forgery and the amount of the check forged was for \$81.70.

Constable Singler will be at the prison door to serve the second warrant, on October 6th, when Davis shall have paid the penalty for his first offense by two years imprisonment.

Aliens in Medieval Times. Medieval England had a rough and ready way of insuring the good behavior of aliens. According to the Saxons law of frankpledge, which remained in force until 1370, no "hosteler" might entertain a foreigner longer than a day and a night unless he undertook to answer for his guest's behavior. No foreigners were allowed to keep hotels in London. Some became naturalized in order to qualify for this privilege. Even those who had suffered to compete on equal terms with the natives, being required to keep their houses "in the heart of the city" and rigidly excluded from the more profitable regions near the Thames.

From Ocean to Ocean by Rail. The completion of the first railway which made it possible to go by rail from the Atlantic to the Pacific was celebrated May 10, 1869, when a gold spike was driven in commemoration of the joining of the Central Pacific and Union Pacific at Promontory, Utah. The scene was commemorated by Ives Harte in a poem and preserved for the admiration of the future by a massive painting which had wide popularity. The similar last spike of the Northern Pacific was driven Sept. 8, 1883, near the mouth of Gold creek, in Montana. On the earlier road the first through car from the Pacific reached New York, July 24, 1870.
