DECISION MAY EFFECT BONDS

Important Ruling by Supreme Court is Expected Soon Which Will Reflect in Great Degree Upon Local Bond Issue.

The decision of the Supreme Court in the next few weeks relative to the validity of the petitions prepared to place a single-tax bill on the ballot for Clackamas County will be of vital importance to Jackson County and its good-road bond issue of \$1,500,000, which it has just voted, according to Attorney General Crawford, says a Salem dispatch.

Practically the same questions of law are incorporated, as the amendment under which the bonds were voted and the amendment under which the proposed single-tax plan would be voted are both strictly county amendments, and it is doubtful whether there is a mode of procedure by which an election could be held legally under either amendment.

In passing on the county tax amendment the Attorney-General held that legislative functions are not vested in counties, as they are in cities and towns under the initiative and referendum amendments and laws, and as a result some definite general law would have to be passed to provide such a mode of law it would be possible to make it comprehensive, so as to include all the amendments, he believes, and yet give counties blanket privileges in voting on various questions as they arise.

He is of the opinion such a law would be necessary before the bond election in Jackson County would be held valid or before the people could vote on the question of county options as far as taxation and exemptions are concerned.

For this reason he takes the stand that in event the Supreme Court refuses to ransdamus Secretary O'cott and fails to compel him to place the Clackamas County single-tax bill on the ballot, it would raise a very serious doubt as to the validity of the Jackson County road bond election, as practically the same questions of law would be involved in each instance.

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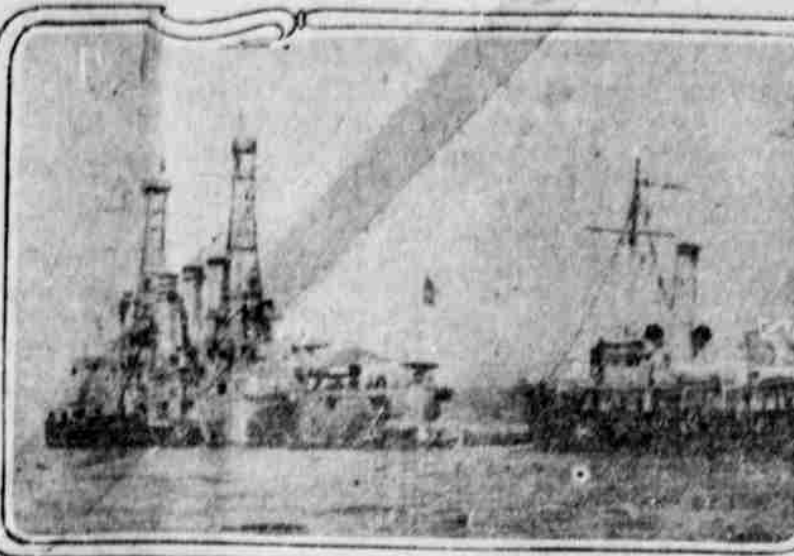
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LITTLE SHIP PREPARING FOR WAR GAME.

YOUNG AVIATOR FALLS TO DEATH

Battered Body of Cromwell Dixon Shipped to New York Where His Widowed Mother Resides—Was Fearfully Injured.

SPOKANE, Wn., Oct. 3.—The battered body of Cromwell Dixon, the 19-year-old Curtiss aviator, who was killed late yesterday afternoon while flying at the Spokane interstate fair, was prepared for shipment to New York today, where his widowed mother resides. J. W. Scott, manager of the Curtiss exhibit company, will probably accompany the body east.

Dixon was fearfully injured by his 100-foot fall. One leg was broken, his face was crushed and he was badly hurt internally that he died forty minutes after the accident from intestinal hemorrhages and concussion of the brain.

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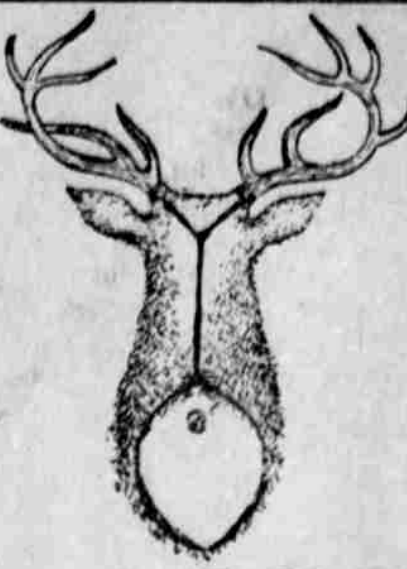
