ELECTRIC LINE IS DISCUSSED

Commercial Club Appoints Dr. Reddy a Committee of One to Meet Representatives of Seattle Company Who are Investigating

The old topic of securing an electric line for the valley was discussed at a meeting of the Medford Commercial club Wednesday evening when it was reported that the Oregon and Southern Railroad company of Seattle would have representatives in the valley about October 10 to look over the local field with a view of establishing an electric road from Grants Pass to Ashland.

The club appointed Dr. J. F. Reddy a committee of one to meet the representatives of the company on their arrival here and entertain them, showing them the possibilities of such a road in the valley.

CEMENT PLANT MAY BE BUILT

R. C. Blake Looks Over Valley with View of Establishing Plant—Addresses Commercial Club at its Meeting Wednesday Night

R. C. Black of Seattle, is being shown about the valley today by a committee of the Commercial club appointed Wednesday evening after Mr. Blake had addressed the club, stating that his company was considering the establishment of a large cement plant in the valley. Mr. Blake did not state definitely what the plans of his company were, but he stated that they were favorably inclined toward such a move.

F. Ossenbrugg, Dr. J. F. Reddy and Secretaries Boos were instructed to show Mr. Blake the resources of the valley along that line at the expense of the club.

It is pointed out that the convicts can be worked throughout the winter upon rock cuts and at rock crushing at a slight expense to the taxpayers, thus solving the problem of constructing the Crater Lake road.
