

HOT FIGHT FOR PENNANT IS ON

Portland Has Good Chance to Grab Championship—Takes First Game of Series by Outfitting the Southerners—Much Interest in Medford

With the betting 10 to 9 in their favor, despite all the rooting of Los Angeles fans, Portland Pacific Coast League champions for 1910 again demonstrated their ability to administer defeat to Happy Hogan's bunch of Tigers.

The heavy hitting of the Vernon tribe has led many to believe that the pennant for 1911 would adorn the suburbs of Los Angeles. After yesterday's swiftest however, when Portland succeeded in out-slugging the Villagers, there are few people today who will deny that the chances of Portland to again cop the flag are indeed bright.

Jones Touts Portland.

Fielder Jones in commenting on the chances of the respective teams picks Portland as the better team. According to an interview with the Oregonian he is quoted as saying "Portland figures to win. Furthermore the Beavers will win. They have the class and it will tell." * * * "Undoubtedly the pennant rests on the coming set to in Los Angeles. The team that wins the series looks like the leader."

With one game safely stowed away in the locker the outlook for the Beavers has improved materially. They are now two points ahead of their hard hitting opponents and in a series where two teams are separated by such a small margin much may happen to cause the downfall of either bunch. The odds however, are in favor of the team ahead. The old adage "Nothing succeeds like success" holds true in baseball as well as in other walks of life.

For the benefit of Medford fans the following statistics are prepared:

Should the teams break even on the series Vernon will be four points ahead; enough to cinch the pennant. Should Portland win five they will be seven points ahead, a margin sufficient to cop the flag if Oakland would win two games from the Villagers a week later. If by any stretch of the imagination, and there are Medford fans who think it can be done, the Beavers stretch their victories to six games, then it must be conceded with anything like an even break in baseball luck for the last two weeks the hunting will again fly in Portland for another year.

CHINNOCK BUSY NEAR GOLD HILL

Pioneers Gather from that Section to Register Their Water Rights—Came to Attend Meeting with Blood in Their Eyes.

GOLD HILL, Or., Oct. 5.—Old timers who have been using water for irrigation and mining purposes from Rogue river and its local tributaries for 40, 50 and some almost 60 years, came to town Tuesday with blood in their eyes at the suggestion that there might be some question as to the validity of their rights, which they thought was implied by a summons to appear before a sitting of the state board of control at this place to take registrations of those rights. They were in nowise pacified when they learned that they would be required to pay a certificate fee of \$1 and an irrigation fee of \$2.50 for the first 16 acres watered, with a graduated fee per acre for every acre over 16.

Time and again Superintendent James T. Chinnock, for water division No. 1, explained that the purpose of the registration was to make the rights secure rather than to raise any question as to their validity, and that the coming adjudication will result in a permanent apportionment of the water which will eliminate the water hog and prevent encroachment by reason of later locations. When the pioneers heard this explanation, they were pleased at the wisdom of the state in making them secure in their rights, thereby insuring them against possible litigation with conflicting claimants.

Upwards of 75 registrations were taken here, representing water rights on Sams creek, Sardine creek, Galls creek, Wards creek, Birdseye creek, Foots creek, Evans creek, Kane creek and Rogue river.

The oldest right registered was one owned by J. W. Hayes, which was secured from the government by Jacob Gall, on the creek named after him, in 1856.

SECTION FOREMAN IS ON TRIAL FOR HIS LIFE

OLYMPIA, Wa., Oct. 5.—George H. Wilson, former section foreman at Rainier for the Northern Pacific railroad, was placed on trial for the murder of Mr. and Mrs. Archie Coble at Rainier on the evening of July 10 in the superior court, yesterday. The work of selecting a jury is progressing slowly and at noon not a juror had been passed.

The Cobles were murdered while asleep in their bed, with an axe and the body of the woman outraged. Wilson was arrested a week later and gave out a statement that while he knew that he killed the couple, he did not remember doing it. He denied this later. The court room is crowded and as there are 46 witnesses to be examined, the case will not go to the jury for a week or more.
