

GREAT STORM WRECKS SONORA

Tidal Wave Sweeps Gulf of Lower California—Many Miles of Track are Washed Away—Storm Still Raging

NOGALES, Ariz., Oct. 6.—Meagre details telling of a devastating storm, accompanied by a tidal wave, on the coast of the state of Sonora, Mexico, reached here today.

Many buildings have been wrecked in the towns of Guaymas and Empalme, according to the report and the damage will run to thousands.

All wires are down south of Meromillo, and full details are not available.

Many miles of tracks are reported washed out, and all trains are hours late.

The storm is still raging with no sign of abatement. It is not known whether any lives were lost.

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal.—With less than a dozen persons in attendance, Dr. A. W. Melbavitt, local dentist, entered a plea of not guilty before Superior Judge B. F. Bledsoe in connection with holding Miss Jessie McDonald a prisoner for sixteen months in a room adjoining his dental parlors.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal.—The first attempt to swim from the Golden Gate to the Farjone Islands will be made in the near future, by Walter Pomeroy. The islands are 28 miles to the west of the Cliff house. Pomeroy figures on swimming the distance in between 12 and 13 hours.

OLYMPIA, Wn.—Leban Wentz, with his bride of a year sitting at his side, holding in her arms the baby born since he was put in jail, was convicted by a jury on a charge of mortgaging property which he did not own.

SEATTLE, Wash.—Mabel Young and Maud Wilson, witnesses in the movement to oust corruption in the Los Angeles police department, are held in jail here, for the arrival of a Los Angeles police officer. They will be taken on a bribery charge to Los Angeles to get them within the jurisdiction of the California courts.

TACOMA, Wn.—Riding the same horses which carried them over the mountain trails, Alva Boggs and John Bustin, Mount Tacoma guides, are off today on a 7000 mile horseback ride to New York, via the Southern States.

TACOMA, Wn.—Thirty-five tall men charge made by Mayor Seymour that he gave out lists of questions in advance to civil service applicants. Browder Brown, discharged member of the civil service board, is suing for \$20,000 damages on a slander charge.

TACOMA, Wn.—Because the lion mother is too weak to nurse his cub, Keeper Olsen of the Point Defiance zoo is advertising for a dog to play foster mother to the lion.

TACOMA, Wn.—Thirty-five tall men are wanted to act as ushers at President Taft's speech at the auditorium. They will wear Prince Alberts, gray cravats, and gray gloves.

PORTLAND, Or.—A herd of elk from Yellowstone Park will be shipped to Oregon and liberated in the national forest at Wallowa, according to State Game Warden Finley today. Several months ago Finley asked the government authorities at Washington to take this action as many elk starve each year in Wyoming. The animals will be shipped as soon as adequate provision for their protection in Oregon has been made.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal.—To see four islands in the process of creation is the novel experience of Fred Schroeder, university man, fillibuster and globe gilder, who is here after a cruise through the Arctic in his schooner Elvira. While three miles from Bogslav, a volcanic peak off the coast of Alaska, Schroeder saw the volcano in eruption, and watched four new islands form in the sea from the lava which it emitted.

LONDON.—Joseph Bell, a Scottish surgeon, who was the original character of Sherlock Holmes, died at Maurice Wood, Milton Bridge, Midlothian yesterday. He instructed Conan Doyle at Edinburgh University. His hobby was the study of mysterious crimes.

AIKEN EXPLAINS HIS PROPOSITION

George H. Aiken of Grants Pass, who has been active recently in connection with railroad lands in this section, has explained his stand in regard to locations on these tracts. A few days ago it was reported that he was locating squatters on railroad land with a promise that they would soon obtain title to the land. This proves to be erroneous but anatural mistake made by some of the men ap-

Mr. Aiken's proposition is that he will show different tracts of desirable land now in litigation to his customers and furnish them with a legal description of the same. 
