

SINGLER BACK WITH DAVIS

Man Walks Out of Prison Cates Only to Find Officer Waiting for Him—Must Face Trial on Another Charge

Constable Singler returned this morning from Salem and with him was Harry Davis whom he arrested at the penitentiary door when he (Davis) had finished a two years term for forgery.

Davis was re-arrested on a warrant sworn out by Warner, Waterman & Gore, charging him with obtaining money under false pretense.

Davis will be remembered as the man who, a couple or three years ago built a dwelling house in the Imperial addition in Medford, which building was burned before it was completed. The building was covered by insurance and at the time it burned there were suspicions that Davis had burned it. The material for the construction of the dwelling had not been paid for at the time of the fire but the fact that the insurance company was a little slow in adjusting the loss and paying the claim, enabled the most of the creditors to present their claims to the company and get their money. Some, however, were not so fortunate and it is these creditors who are now prosecuting Davis.

Davis left here soon after the residue of the insurance money had been paid him and he was not heard of again until he was arrested for forgery committed some place in the Willamette valley.

La Follette Given Boost

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 7.—Senator Robert M. LaFollette was endorsed for president at a meeting of the Progressive Republican league of King county last night. Resolutions were also adopted urging Governor Hay to call a special session of the legislature to amend the primary election laws, and denouncing the "picked delegation" plan for county and state conventions.

RESERVE LOCOMOTIVES FOR PRESIDENT'S USE

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 7.—With the arrival of President Taft in the northwest today it developed that officials of the Southern Pacific have reserved locomotives in various division points in Oregon and California to assure no delay of the president's special on account of the shopmen's strike.

Despite the fact that many engines have gone "dead", it is reported here that at least one engine in first class repair has been kept in division round houses for use only in drawing the special.

The president's train will not travel over Harriman tracks again until Thursday, October 12, when Taft leaves Portland for San Francisco.

CAN UNCLE SAM SELL BOOZE IN DRY TOWN?

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Oct. 7.—Washington, D. C., may be asked to pass on the question of the right of the federal government to violate the law, in this state as a result of a protest that is being made against an advertisement appearing in a Blaine paper today announcing that the customs officers will, on October 12 dispose at auction of a quantity of wet goods seized from persons coming into the United States from Canada. Blaine is dry and the citizens of that place object to having enough wet stuff put on the market to keep the inhabitants in a state of joy for a week. An appeal may be made to Washington.

JAPAN PLANS MANY SHIPS

Prepares Naval Budget of \$175,000,000 to Better Her Navy—Several Battleships and Cruisers are to be Built

TOKIO, Oct. 7.—Contradicting the reports abroad of Japan's poverty, the government announced today that it had prepared a naval budget for the expenditure of three hundred million yen, (\$175,000,000) which will be expended during the next seven years.

Several battleships, two armored cruisers of 30,000 tons each, and some smaller warships, are included in the plans. These additions to its navy will place Japan's rating with those of the great powers.

IMPROVING END OF EAST MAIN

Street Commissioner Baker Cutting Down Embankment Leading to Siskiyou Heights—Improvement is Very Much Needed

Street Commissioner Baker has a gang of men at work cutting down the approach to the East Main street paving. The paved street grade leading up to this point is about five feet lower than the road from that point on east on Siskiyou heights and it is this approach which Mr. Baker is now working on. The earth to be excavated will be from 300 to 400 feet in length and will vary in depth from three to five feet. Some of the excavating can be done with plows and scrapers, but the deepest of it Mr. Baker will tunnel and blow out with dynamite.
