

### BEAVER MEAT SOARS IN PRICE

Portland Makes it Three Straight and it Looks Like Vernon Had Lost All Hope of Grabbing the Pennant—Vernon Outclassed

Tom was a little bit off on Wednesday when he escaped to hold the Vernon sluggers, but as he has probably the best control of the "big five," he is in line to pitch anything from a shut-out to five hits any day he starts. #### Pennant Prospects Good.

By making it three straight yesterday Portland has made a gap of thirteen points between the two teams. This is quite an item when two teams are closely bunched at the end of the season and will probably spell defeat to Vernon. Still baseball is different from any other game and much may happen before next Tuesday to change the outlook.

### FEDERAL BUILDING SITE DEED FILED

Government Records Warranty Deed to Property on Sixth Street with County Recorder—Work on Building Should Start Soon

The government of the United States now owns real property in Medford.

A warranty deed was placed on record yesterday at the court house by which Bert Anderson and W. C. Gruen conveyed to the United States property in block 66, Medford. This is the site for the new federal building and the consideration in the purchase was \$1.

The tract purchased is on the northwest corner of Hally and West Sixth streets. The negotiations for its purchase were started over a year ago, but there were so many complications and defects that all this time has been required in perfecting title.

Congress has appropriated \$110,000 for the construction of a federal building in Medford, \$26,000 of which was made available for 1911, but owing to the fact that the building season for big projects will soon close it is doubtful if work will commence on the building before next spring.
