\$4.50 IS PAID FOR D'ANJOURS

First Car of d'Anjous Is Shipped to European Market—Five Carloads of Winter Nells at \$2.25 F. O. B. Are Shipped.

Comice pears from the Griffin Creek Orchard company's orchards and Charles Darby's orchards sold in New York City on October 9 for \$3.10 per box, in half box packs. D'Anjous, from the orchards of the Griffin Creek Orchard company, Dr. J. H. Blissell and Welch & Bally sold in the same market at \$4.50 per box in full box packs. Fall Butler pears from the valley sold at \$2.80 in the New York market. These shipments were handled by the Producers' Fruit company of Medford.

This same company yesterday shipped the last of a five carload shipment of winter Nells. All of these go to the London market and were sold at \$2.25 per box f. o. b. Medford.

A carload of Rogue River valley DeAnjou and Comice pears were shipped from New York City by steamer St. Louis on October 7, for the London market. This is the first shipment of DeAnjous ever made to a foreign market from this valley. These were shipped through the Producers' Fruit company of this city.

ENGLAND'S LARGEST SHIP IS LAUNCHED

PORTMOUTH, Eng., Oct. 11.—"King George V.," England's best and largest battleship, is afloat here today after a successful launching. The vessel has a displacement of 23,000 tons, is 555 feet long, has engines of 31,000 horsepower and is expected to make twenty-one knots an hour. Her armament consists of ten 13.5 inch guns and twenty-four 4-inch guns.
