

MEDFORD PLAYS SPLENDID GAME

Local High School Team Deserves
Much Credit for Veteran Manner
in Which They Handled First Hard
Tussle of Season.

With scarcely a trace of early season nervousness the Medford high school football team walked all over the husker eleven from Grants Pass Thursday. The score was 39 to 0 and might have been much larger had the local team sprung a greater variety of plays most of which they wisely saved for later games.

The local team appears to have a strong chance for the championship if anything can be judged from the first game. For any high school eleven to successfully carry out 14 forward passes out of 16 attempts is remarkable and shows faithful practice and good coaching. The work of the ends, insofar as it was tested out against the weak Grants Pass opposition, stood out noticeably and the strength of the Medford line was surprising. The line stood all the Grants Pass attacks for if the team from the north had any training or skill it was in line bucks. In the open game they were miserably equipped. Their attack on tackles with Fullback Orme carrying the ball seemed their prize card but it never won them the required yardage.

Medford's scores were made, for the most part, on the forward pass. It is surprising that Grants Pass could not solve the play and force the local boys to change tactics, but so long as the Pass lads were helpless, Captain Ware displayed fine judgment by using the same play over and over. It afforded fine practice and always meant at least ten yards. The Medford team had but little chance to buck the Pass line on offense but what they did shows they are able to handle themselves in that department.

The features of the game were remarkably accurate forward passes and the quick handling of them by the ends, McDonald and Beveridge. Both these ends are fine runners in the open field. Tug Isaac's presence of mind and good judgment stamp him as a corner of college calibre. Twice he disregarded signals and threw the ball to the right end, when signal called for left, because he saw that the chances were better. One of these plays netted a touchdown. He was in the game from start to finish, playing hard, and with Captain Ware shared the backfield honors. Ware is a smashing player good on both offensive and defensive.

As in any first season game one could pick flaws were he so inclined. There is need of more practice in goal kicking, and the punting was such that it was the only department in which Grants Pass excelled, but with lots of time to practice and with a team that is not apt to become overconfident there is every reason for Medford fans to look for a championship team.
