Men Who Are Investigating Local Conditions Are Very Much Impressed With Outlook—W. I. Vawter Has Been Retained as Ality.

The men who are here, Messrs. Doyle and Narren, for the purpose of looking this territory over with a view to putting in an interurban electric railroad line from Grants Pass to Ashland are very enthusiastic over the outlook.

Vawter, and should nothing present itself in a legal way which would tend to discourage them they will take up the matter of securing city franchises and rights of way in the country, villages and cities through which the line will run.

## DEEP WATERWAY CONGRESS OPENS IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 14.—The lakes to the gulf deep waterways convention has opened here. Governor Eberhart of Minnesota was the principal speaker. He urged the building of the waterway to connect the lakes and the gulf as the only means of securing for the United States the full value of the Panama Canal.

"Unless this is done," said the governor, "the greatest benefits of the canal will be lost, and the colossal enterprise will be chiefly valuable to Europe as a short-haul to the Pacific."
