SOUTHERN PACIFIC PAYS \$21,626,282

Annual Report Filed With the Railroad Commission of This State—Details for Oregon Will Be Sent to State Board Later.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 17.—The annual report of the Southern Pacific company was filed today with the railroad commission. The report covered the entire line, separate reports for Oregon being in up to the date of the report.

Operating revenues were \$91,108,761.40, and operating expenses \$52,234,137.34, leaving a net operating revenue of \$38,874,624.06. Dividends of \$21,626,282.08, on stocks were declared during the ruling year.

The company has had during the year 43,764 employees and has paid out \$29,190,539.82 to them in wages. The mileage of lines operated is given as 6198.28, number of passengers carried was 34,199,459, and the number carried one mile was 1,429,600,384.

Over 18,000,000 tons of freight were carried and over 4,000,000,000 tons carried one mile. The total freight revenue for the year was approximately \$53,000,000, and the passenger revenue \$31,000,000. Details for Oregon will be sent later to the commission.
