

STATION SITE NOT YET CHOSEN

James Withycombe Writes That Committee Will Not Arrive for a Few Days Owing to Absence of President Kerr.

That the matter of establishing the southern Oregon experiment station in one of the southern Oregon communities which are bidding for it has not yet been settled but will be in the near future, is the word received from James Withycombe, director of the Oregon experiment station at Corvallis, whose letter is as follows:

"The matter of establishing the southern Oregon experiment station is as yet unsettled. The board of regents of the Oregon Agricultural college left this matter to a committee consisting of Hon. J. K. Weatherford of Albany, president of the board of regents, Hon. J. D. Olwell of Medford, a member of the board, and Dr. W. J. Kerr, president of the college. The recent delay is due to the fact that President Kerr was suddenly called east on account of illness in his family. Upon his return I feel sure the committee will visit southern Oregon. He is expected to return tomorrow."

"This I cannot do, owing to my judicial duties. I want to extend thanks to the players, the press, and most of all to the fans, for their loyal support of the league during my term as executive."
Graham was elected president of the league in 1909.
