**PIONEER LADY
 PASSES AWAY**

Elizabeth I. Vault Kenny of Jacksonville Dies Aged 79—Crossed the Plains to the State of Oregon in 18845.

Elizabeth T. Vault Kenny, who crossed the plains to Oregon in 1845, died this morning at 8 o'clock at her home in Jacksonville, of general debility. Mrs. Kenny was 79 years of age and leaves to mourn her passing; two sons, Thomas J. and William G. Kenny.

The passing of Mrs. Kenny removes one of the first white women in Oregon. With her parents she crossed plains to this state in 1845. Upon many occasions she acted as interpreter for the Indians. Her father was editor of the first paper in the state.

Mrs. Kenny was born in Kentucky, a descendant of Daniel Boone. The funeral services will be held from the residence at Jacksonville Sunday afternoon at 1 o'clock. Interment will be in the Jacksonville cemetery.
