ANTI-HAWLEY TIMBER FOUND

Lively Fight at Primaries in April Is Predicted—Oregon City and Salem Have Prominent Men Who Would Make Race.

Republicans of the first congressional district, comprising all the counties of western Oregon outside of Multnomah, are likely to have a lively fight at the primaries next April in choosing a successor to Willis C. Hawley.

Hawley, with his standpat record, is declared by his opponents to be weaker than ever before. Several candidates in the progressive ranks are being mentioned, among the latest being George C. Brownell, of Oregon City, former state senator.

Another Oregon City progressive who is being urged is State Senator Walter A. Dimick. The latter is said to be disinclined to run, because of the expense involved in making the canvass. He has two years of an unexpired term in the state senate to serve.

George F. Rodgers, former mayor of Salem, is another prospective candidate. His friends urge that he could split the vote of Marion county with Hawley, where both reside, and he is well known in other counties of the district. A third Marion county man mentioned is C. L. McNary, brother and partner of the district attorney, John H. McNary.

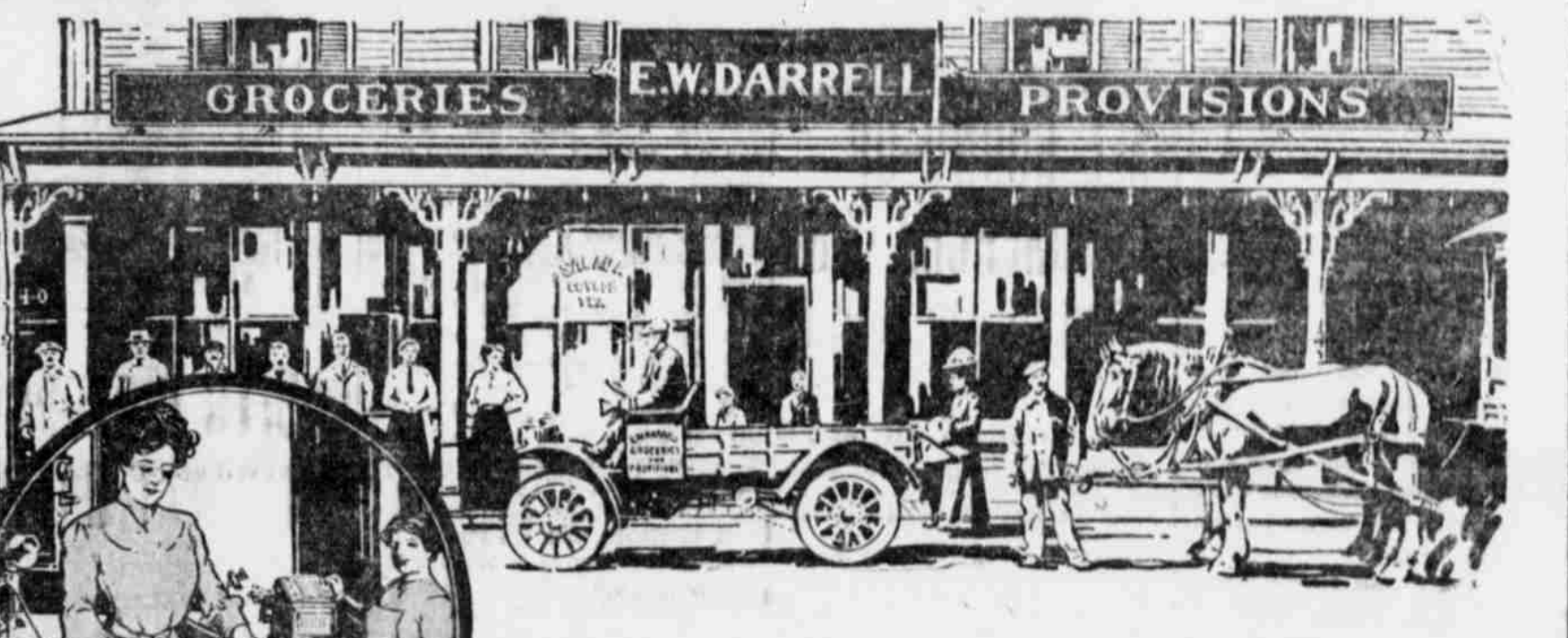
