Dr Brown holds out little hope of ulti mate recovery and concludes as fol lows: "There is a small chance that the tumor may be removed en tirely. That is the reason for oper ation again in an apparently almohopeless case."

> Insurgency is rampant throughout the nation. Old systems, old methods, have been weighed and found wanting, and the people are determined to try new. They are weary and sick of the smug hypoerisy of the stand-patter preaching the doctrine of the salvation of the ruling few and the damnation of the governed many-of the prostitution of government.

The old formulas have been outgrown and are being brushed aside. Indifference which permitted the growth of a ruling caste, is being replaced by an awakened citzenship that promises the salvation of the republic and the regeneration of democracy.

President Taft heeds not the gathering storm. He is as utterly unable to comprehend the insurgent upheaval as Louis of France was to understand the revolution. He seeks to restore a day whose sun has forever set, of a political order that has passed away. It is the blind leading the blind.

That is why the president heeded the voice of the owner of the reactionary Oregonian, that hasn't been right ou public question in years. And that is why he listened to Ralph Williams and other discredited assemblyites. That is why he had no remarks to make concerning the Oregon system. That is why he snubbed the progressive governor of California and showered attentions upon Duncan McKinley, the stand-pat lame duck.

The assemblyites have promised to deliver Oregon to Taft in the next national convention. Under assembly methods they might. Under popular primaries, it will be a tremendous task. Nor did Taft's gloom tour of the coast help him any. Rather it weakened him. As the St. Louis Mirror remarks

"The president is a pitcous spectacle on the stump. His fingers are all thumbs and his feet are full of shoes and it is doubtful if any political chicken as sick as he is ever got well. Without a Roosevelt to do his fighting he is lost. The people he harangues are respectful, but unconvinced. He sews himself up hopelessly, for in one breath he talks free trade in defense of his reciprocity measure, and in the next he talks protection to which free trade is the unpardonable sin. His present tour is worse than a mistake; it is a disaster. If he should continue his present course much longer he will nominate Robert Mariou La Follette for president."
