

GENERAL KILLED BOMB EXPLOSION

Imperial Commanders Throughout Chinese Empire Are Demoralized as a Result of the Assassination of General.

SHANGHAI, Oct. 26.—General Feng Shan, commander of the garrison at Canton, is reported to have been killed by a bomb explosion, according to advices received here. First reports stated that the general had escaped although members of his escort were killed.

The revolutionists are said to have plotted General Feng Shan's destruction with secret allies in his service. The rebels are declared to have despatched him out of the way in preparation for an attack on Canton.

An able soldier and a strategist, he would have made a brave defense against occupation of the city, which is thought to be the next move of the rebel army. Imperial commanders throughout the empire are reported in a state bordering on demoralization as a result of the assassination.

NOTED AUTOMOBILE OFFICIAL KILLED

TIFTON, Ga., Oct. 26.—S. M. Butler, chairman of the contest board of the American Automobile Association, was instantly killed here when the Cunningham car, pacemaker for the Glidden tour, turned turtle outside Tifton.

P. J. Walker, the referee, sustained a fractured collarbone, and Mrs. Walker's shoulder was dislocated. The injured were brought here. The tour has been postponed.

Butler resided in New York. The Walkers are from San Francisco.

HUNT AND WELLS ARE NOMINEES IN ARIZONA

PHOENIX, Ariz., Oct. 26.—Geo. W. P. Hunt of Globe, democratic nominee for governor, will fight it out with Edwin W. Wells, republican, of Prescott, on December 12 for the honor of being the first state executive of Arizona.

Although forty hours have elapsed since the polls closed the state vote has not been entirely counted. It is certain, however, that Hunt has beaten his nearest opponent for the democratic nomination by about 2,800 majority. It is equally certain that Wells has been nominated by the republicans.

MEN JURORS MAY SMOKE SAY OFFICERS

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 26.—While granting all other requests of women jurors to make it easier for them to perform this duty, the county commissioners refused to make a rule against smoking on the part of the men. That would be a hardship, they declare. The women will be provided with separate retiring rooms and a woman bailiff. Eight women are now on the jury.

NO RACE SUICIDE AT BELFAST, WASHINGTON

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Oct. 26.—Belfast, near here, had a population of twenty-five at the first of September. Now it has thirty-five and all the new arrivals are babies. Four babies arrived in sets of two.

PIONEER RESIDENT HAS PASSED AWAY

William P. Johnson, who crossed the plains in 1854, died at the Sacred Heart hospital Wednesday. Mr. Johnson had been a resident of Medford twelve years. He was 79 years 7 months and 21 days old. Recently he has resided at Glendale, Ore.

Mr. Johnson leaves a wife, Mary A. Johnson; three daughters, Mrs. F. Henderson, Hornbrook, Cal.; Mrs. L. A. Hill, Sisson, Cal.; Mrs. Lena N. Cook, Glendale, Ore., and five sons: F. S. Johnson, Sisson, Cal., L. C. Johnson, Medford; Bert Johnson, Medford; J. L. and L. A. Johnson of Portland.

The interment will be in the Jacksonville cemetery.

DR COOK IS "ROTTEN-EGGED"

Driven From Lecture Hall When He Attempted to Prove Himself Maligned Instead of a Fakir—Sought Refuge in Hotel.

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 26.—Feted like a king here two years ago when he was acclaimed the discoverer of the north pole, Dr. Frederick Cook is "digesting" a shower of rotten eggs with which he was driven from a lecture hall when he attempted to prove himself maligned instead of a fakir.

Cook's former supporter, Dr. Neeson, denounced the Brooklyn explorer to his face, and then the riot started. Cook fled by the back door.

SAYS ITALY A BRIGAND; TURKEY THE PURSE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 26. En route to San Francisco where he is commissioned by the new sultan to lay the foundation of a Turkish exhibit for the Panama Pacific exposition, Sidkey Bey, one of the leaders of the Young Turks in the recent Ottoman revolution, and formerly secretary of the Turkish legation at Washington, today talked of the Turkish Italian war. "That war," he said, "is nothing short of highway robbery with Italy the brigand and Turkey the purse. Turkey will lose, but it will cost Italy millions annually in the loss of Turkish trade."
