ALDERMAN TALK ON SCHOOL LAWS

Teachers Attending Institute Hear Many interesting and Instructive Addresses—School Officers in Session.

The principal address this morning at the teachers' convention was by Prof. L. R. Alderman on "Oregon School Laws."

In the department sessions Maude Laughhead subject was the "Source of Language Material"; Montana Hastings talked of "Composition in Upper Grades"; "A Seminary Investigation into Study Values" was a subject handled by George Reber.

The convention of Jackson county school officers took up a good part of the morning session.

There was a large attendance of officers at this convention and many matters of importance to school advancement were discussed. Dr. R. C. Kelsey, of Gold Hill, was elected chairman of the convention and Wellborn Beeson, of Talent, secretary. A central purchasing committee composed of Supt. Wells, Wellborn Beeson and C. P. Briggs was appointed.

The convention will reassemble this afternoon and several questions are booked to come up for discussion.

The department sessions this afternoon will be conducted by Maude Laughhead, Montana Hastings, J. H. Ackerman and H. E. Redding.

The closing address at 3:30 this afternoon will be by Prof. J. H. Ackerman, and his subject will be "Advance Steps in Oregon's Educational System, Past and Present."

The exhibits of sewing and drawing made by the students of the Medford schools is creating no end of favorable comment by the visiting teachers. These exhibits may be seen by Medford people at the high school building Saturday afternoon from 2 until 5 o'clock.
