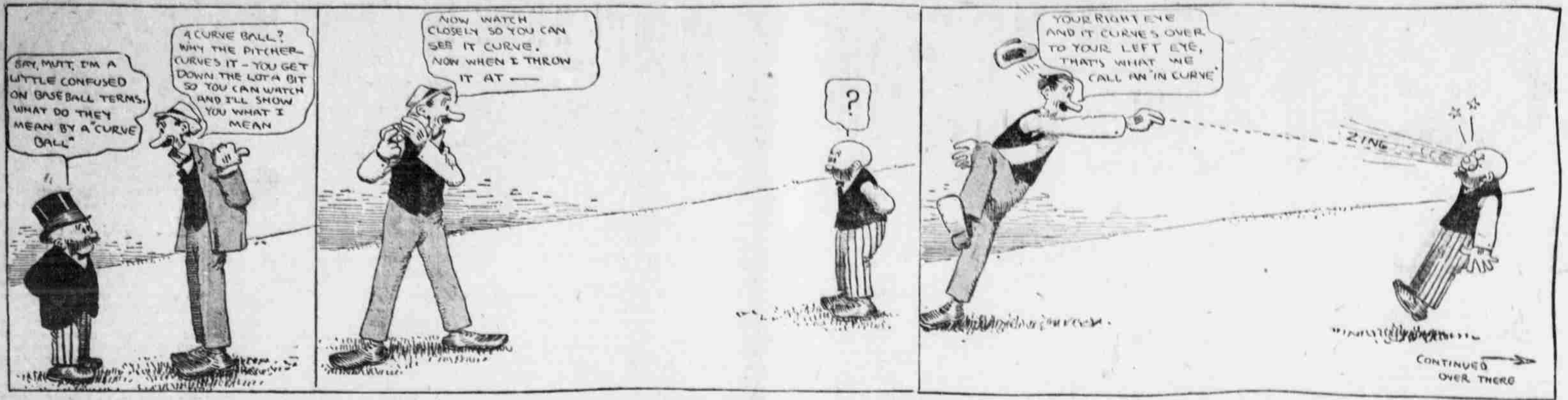


Some of These Fine Days Jeff Is Going to Get Very

PACIFIC FLEET AT SAN PEDRO

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 28.—That the revolt in China may cut short the manoeuvres of the Pacific fleet in San Pedro harbor is the belief of naval officers, who predict that it will be necessary to send at least a portion of the squadron to the far east to protect the lives and property of Americans in the Orient. The American legation in China has already cabled Washington that warships are needed, and as the only fighting craft this government has

MINERS GO BACK TO WORK AFTER 8 MONTHS

WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 28.—It is announced that settlement of the miners' strike in Alberta and British Columbia has been reached as a result of a consultation in which Minister of the Interior Rogers, the miners and representatives of the mine operators will take part.

The agreement provides a ten per cent increase in wages, recognition of the check-off system and reforms in the contract system. These propositions will be submitted to the strikers' referendum. It is understood that the agreement will be effective three years.

The men have been out eight months.

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
