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OCTOBER, 1911, DRIEST IN YEARS

Not Since 1895 Has There Been Less Moisture Than This Year—Mean for Past 23 Years Has Been 1.70 Inches.

The month of October has been the driest recorded in 15 years according to the local weather bureau. There are but two other years since 1889 when the precipitation was less.

P. J. O'Gara, special meteorological observer, has compiled his report for the month as follows:

Mean maximum, 69.7 degrees; mean minimum, 36.8 degrees; maximum, 82 degrees, on October 7; minimum, 30 degrees on October 11; greatest daily range, 45 degrees on October 20; total precipitation, 0.43 inches; greatest in 24 hours, 0.16 inch on the 4th; number of clear days 19, partly cloudy 8, cloudy 4.

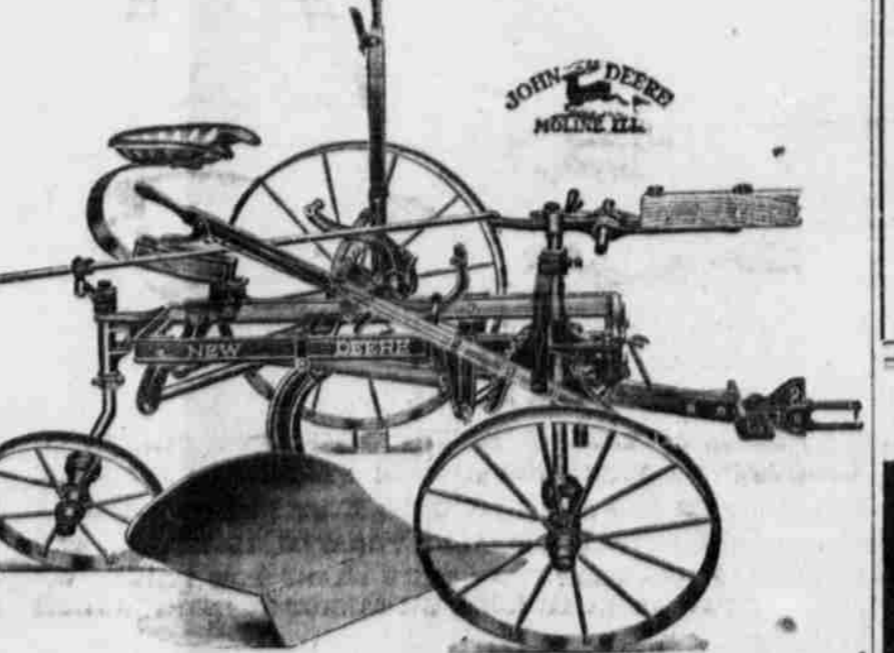
