

### MINING COMPANY WILL BUILD MILL

Palmer Creek Gold Mines, Inc., Plans Extensive Improvements on Their Properties—Mine Located Near the Famous "Steamboat" Property

The directors and stockholders of the Palmer Creek Gold Mines, Inc., a local mining corporation, have decided to build a combined free gold and cyanide mill on its property on Palmer creek, a tributary of the Big Applegate in the southwest corner of Jackson county, 26 miles from Medford. This is in the immediate vicinity of the celebrated "Steamboat" mine.

Developments on this property has exposed a large deposit of very high grade ore in the form of small particles of quartz and slate, mixed with a large amount of clay and decomposed vein matter. This deposit is all on the surface and it is estimated that there is enough of it to keep a plant of 100 tons capacity busy for several years.

Tests of the ore demonstrated that 95 per cent of the values can be saved and at the expense of not over 65 cents per ton for mining and milling.

There are also several fine veins of quartz on the claims which show good values. Circular in paying quantities has also been discovered.

The company expects to finance the enterprise during the winter months by the sale of a block of its treasury stock and complete preparations for erecting its plant in the early spring, or as soon as the roads are in condition for transporting the machinery.

The tests were made by the California Ore Testing company of San Francisco and by Earl V. Ingels of Grants Pass, Ore., and the ore was pronounced ideal cyaniding ore and the values exceptionally high.

The company owns and controls 24 full sized claims, the ground embraced in these claims being covered by a heavy growth of fine timber and there is plenty of water for power and mill purposes.

The stockholders are well known local citizens, who enjoy the respect and confidence of the public and the management is in the hands of men of large experience in mining and other business.

M. A. Kinlevside is the president, Mr. R. L. McBride is vice-president, J. R. Whitmore is secretary and treasurer while F. G. Andrews and J. M. Fisher make up the balance of the directory.

### NINE DIE WHEN FACTORY BURNS

Imperial Powder Company Suffers Disaster—E. C. Tice of the Company Has Been in Medford Recently Arranging for Factory Here.

CEBHALIS, Wn., Nov. 2.—The death of Bertha Crown at St. Helen's hospital at 11 o'clock last night, and the finding of another charred body, unidentified, this morning, brings the total death list of yesterday's fire in the Imperial Powder company works to nine.

The fire is believed to have been of incendiary origin. Four of the buildings were destroyed, the loss being in the neighborhood of \$60,000.

The ninth body found is so badly charred that it is impossible to distinguish whether it belonged to a man or a woman.

Police Chief Doyle believes that the fire started when a kettle of paraffine boiled over, giving the girls in the works no chance for escape.

E. C. Tice of the Imperial Powder company has been in this city for some time and was immediately advised by wire of the disaster.

Mr. Tice has just made arrangements for the establishment of a powder factory in Medford, being associated with F. D. Frazier and F. D. McQuilliken.

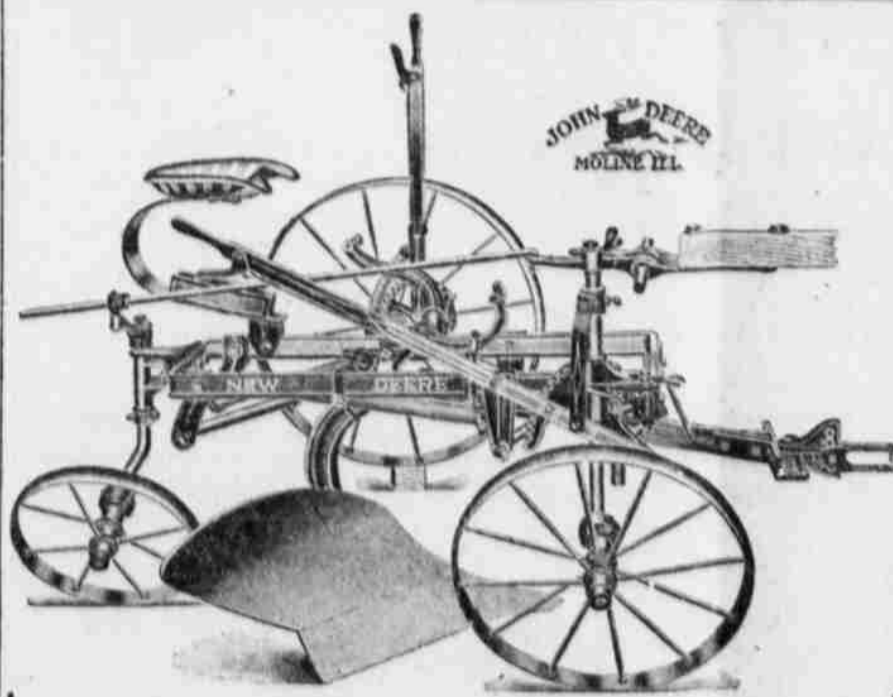
