Will Give Up Original Plan of Hauling Rock With Traction Engines to Central Point Boulevard but Will Use Railroad Instead.

John Twohy, of the firm of Twohy Brothers, railroad contractors and builders, has been in Medford for several days looking over the situation in connection with the construction of the Medford-Central Point macadam road, for which this firm has the contract.

The construction work on this road has not been pushed as vigorously as it might have been for the past two weeks, owing to the company's big hauling engines being out of repair, but Mr. Twohy has "ditched" these engines and has formulated new plans for getting the rock in place on the road.

Mr. Twohy left last night for Portland where he will endeavor to secure permission from the Southern Pacific railroad company to haul rock for the road over their line from the Medford yards to the Pacific & Eastern junction where it will be hauled in wagons to the road, only a short distance.

Should he fail to secure this he will at once build large bunkers in Medford into which the rock will be dumped when hauled here from Jacksonville over the Rogue River Valley railroad. The rock will then be hauled from these bunkers to the road in large automobile trucks.

Mr. Twohy has assured the county officials that the road will surely be built this fall. Thirty days' work, Mr. Twohy says, will complete the contract and that weather conditions will not interfere with its progress when rock hauling is once started.
