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8.84 MILES OF PAVING LAID

Clark & Henry Will Wind Up Season Early in the Coming Week—Have Completed \$370,000 Worth of Work This Season.

The Clark & Henry Construction company will complete all of its paving work for the 1911 season in Medford early in the coming week, and when completed will have improved 8.84 miles of streets with hard surface. This will make the total length of streets paved in the city 17.27 miles, costing three quarters of a million dollars.

The Clark & Henry company has completed contracts to an amount of \$370,000 this season, laying 174,870 square yards of paving. Next week the season will end.

The Jacobsen-Bade company is now at work cleaning up its contracts in this city for water and sewer mains, being at work on South Central, Riverside and Holly. They have laid this season approximately six miles of water mains, and six of sewer mains.
