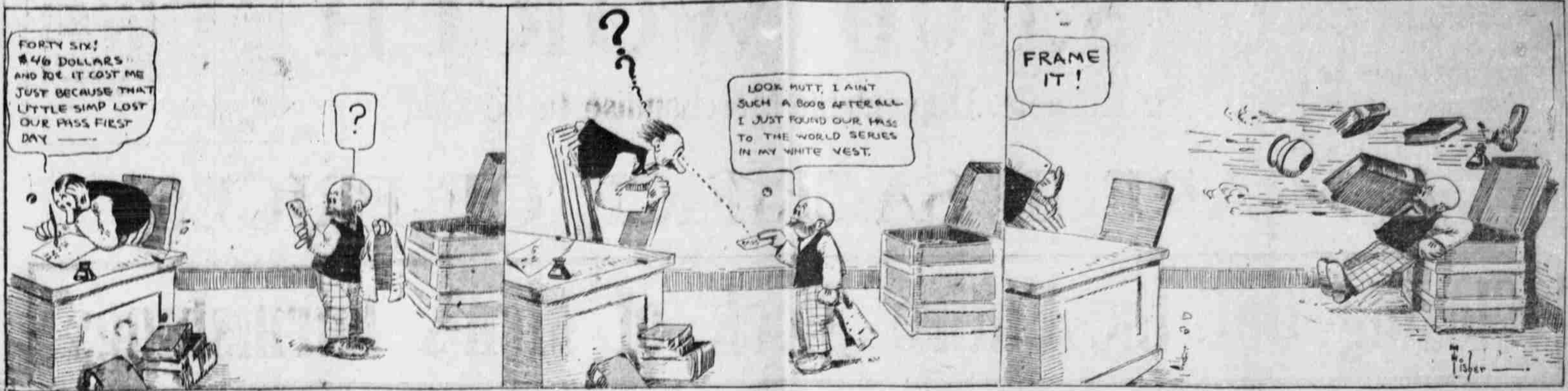


Get Into Trouble Losing Things
