HITCHING RACKS ARE PROVIDED

H. C. Kentner With Co-operation of Other Business Men Provide Place for Hitching Teams in City—Is Free to All.

The much talked of free public hitching racks are now installed on the premises of the Natatorium Amusement company.

This improvement was brought about by the efforts of H. C. Kentner who personally conducted the whole affair and with the co-operation of the progressive spirits of the Medford business and professional men, together with the Natatorium company, a hitching place with gravel drive is now open to any who wish to use it.

They accommodate 100 teams and should the occasion require they will be enlarged to accommodate more.

The Natatorium company have agreed to allow free use of their building for waiting rooms and there are facilities there for checking parcels, wraps, etc.

The municipality has also borne a hand in this improvement by agreeing to furnish lights.

Merchants Already Preparing for Coming Thanksgiving Festival—Prevailing Prices Will Be Average According to Merchants.

Merchants throughout the city are preparing for the coming Thanksgiving festival when heavy demands will be made for meats and sweetmeats to satisfy the epicures who are looking forward to a feast at a nominal price.

Best information obtainable today indicated that there would be large stores of every Thanksgiving commodity and that the prevailing prices would be the average. The year has been good for turkeys and all the raisers in this section have large fat flocks. Medford will have an advantage over other sections in that all the fowl will be fresh, with the cold-storage birds being left for the city folks.

All the merchants have laid in their supply of holiday cranberries. The bulk of the cranberry crop is in cold storage waiting for distribution according to the demand.

Vegetables are best this year and are available in abundance.

NEW FACTORY IN CITY IS ASSURED

Secretary Israel of Imperial Powder Company States That Company Will Proceed With Building of Factory Here.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Nov. 5.—The officials of the Imperial Powder company—C. M. Cole, president; G. C. Israel, secretary-treasurer, and V. L. Bieder, superintendent—are much dejected over the frightful accident of Wednesday at their company's plant when eight young women and girls of this city lost their lives.

This morning Mr. Israel, speaking from the company's standpoint, announced that the work of rebuilding the factory will be taken up at once.

Mr. Israel states that the financial end of the business is giving no trouble. The new factory projected at Medford, Ore., will be built at once, and a second at either Reno, or Tonopah, Nev., will be erected.
