

GOVERNORS TO BOOST WEST

Trip of Governors Special Throughout the East Promises to Accomplish a Great Deal of Good for the Coast.

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 11.—That the commercial organizations of the state of Oregon, are alive to the opportunity of advantageously advertising their sections of the state, in the east, through the medium of the tour of the western "Governors' Special," seems to be assured from the number of communications that are being received daily by Reilly Atkinson, manager of the tour, asking information as to whether arrangements have been made for the distribution of literature from the different sections of the state.

Practically every town in Oregon seems to be vitally interested in the tour of the special, and in many of them special editions of literature descriptive of the peculiar advantages that the district in question, has to offer to the eastern home-seekers are being published solely for distribution on the tour of the east.

This is practically the decision of Judge Dykeman when he denied the injunction asked by the Crescent Manufacturing company to restrain W. E. Brown of the Sanitary Market Grocery, from selling their coffee under 40 cents a pound. Brown sells the coffee for 36 cents and avers that he makes 25 per cent profit. The company has a suit against him now for \$1000 damages which is still pending.

PAVING WORK IS COMPLETED

Clark & Henery Wind Up All of Their Contracts in the City and Central Point—Are Putting Plant in Shape for Winter.

The Clark & Henery Construction company have completed all of its paving work for the 1911 season in Medford. They have improved 8.84 miles of streets with hard surface. This makes the total length of streets paved in the city 17.27 miles, costing three-quarters of a million dollars.

The Clark & Henery company has completed contracts to an amount of \$370,000 this season, laying 174,870 square yards of paving. The company has also completed its work at Central Point and is now putting its plant in readiness for winter.

THINK LOOT WILL BE FOUND

Former Wife of Noted Bank Wrecker Tells Officers Where Her Husband Said He had Cashed Coin Before His Arrest.

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—Four hundred and twenty-two thousand dollars worth of loot, hidden by David Rothschild, the sensational bank wrecker, before going to Sing Sing prison, may be recovered, according to disclosures made here today by Mrs. Batten, former wife of the robber, who declares that before his death in prison, Rothschild divulged the hiding place of his spoils to her. District Attorney Whitman is investigating the woman's statement.

Mrs. Batten declared that Rothschild told her that he deposited \$237,000 in a safety vault in the Coak Exchange Bank and \$185,000 in a vault in Jersey City. She says that he deposited the money in the name of "Levy" in both instances.
