WOODFORD TO CARE FOR LOT

Is Named Custodian of Block Owned by United States on Sixth Street Where New Federal Building Is Some Day to Rise.

Gradually the nearness of actual operations on the new federal building is becoming apparent. This morning Postmaster Woodford received notice from the treasury department appointing him custodian of the grounds upon which the new post-office building is to be erected, which is the northwest corner of West Main and Holly streets.

The significance of this appointment is that the government has not lost sight of the fact that congress had appropriated \$110,000 for the erection of a federal building in Medford. While there has seemingly been considerable delay in this matter there has really been none on the part of the government, as the title to the land was perfected only a month or six weeks ago.
