

JURY FAILS TO PLACE GUILT

Rogoway's Death May Never Be Avenged—Jury Finds He Came to His Death at Hands of Unknown Parties.

"The coroner's jury, after due inquisition, finds the body to be that of Nathan Rogoway, a native of Russia, aged about 23 years, and that he came to his death on or about the 26th day of May, 1911, from a gunshot wound inflicted by a party or parties unknown to this jury."

Such was the verdict returned by the coroner's jury which for a couple of weeks has been attempting to find a clue to the manner in which Nathan Rogoway, the Albany hide buyer, met his death. It is practically certain that the body was taken to Kingsbury in an automobile from Medford, but beyond that nothing definite could be ascertained.

The inquest was resumed Friday afternoon. Among the witnesses was Louis I. Wheeler, Ashland chauffeur, who, it had been suggested, might know something of the auto which took the body from Medford. Wheeler, however, succeeded in clearing himself from all connection with the matter.

Wheeler was questioned at length as to his whereabouts at the time of Rogoway's disappearance on May 26. The only reason why his testimony was desired was for the reason that he carried many passengers between Ashland and Medford and sold his car and left the city soon after the time of Rogoway's mysterious disappearance.

He testified that his car was out of commission on May 26, being laid up in one of the local repair shops where some work was being done on the magneto. He also gave a good account of his whereabouts and denied positively having had anything to do with bringing Rogoway's body from Medford.

Two other slight clues have been obtained. These tend to verify the theory that the body was carried to the springs in an auto and thence dragged into the brush. It is said that G. W. Jones, the road supervisor, spent the night of May 26 in a barn at the forks of the road just the other side of Kingsbury Springs. He and his crew were working on that section of the road. About 11 o'clock according to the account given, Jones heard an automobile pass the forks, turning to the left on the Wagner Springs road. This road passes within about a quarter of a mile of the spot where the body was found. Jones' curiosity was aroused because of the unusual circumstance. He heard the machine return at 1 o'clock in the morning. His curiosity was still further aroused and the next day he is said to have followed the auto tracks. They led about three-quarters of a mile past the forks and then turned out of the road directly toward the spot where Rogoway's body was later found. There is passage way for a machine here to go several hundred yards toward the brush. It is said that Jones verified the date as May 16 from the fact that he kept a record of the work done on that section of the road.

Another slight clue was offered in a rumor which gained circulation to the effect that on the night of the tragedy a telephone call was received at the local hospital saying that a man had been shot and asking if he would be received and cared for at the hospital. That was the last heard of the patient at the hospital. A little testimony was taken on this subject last Saturday, but nothing conclusive was obtained connecting it with the Rogoway murder.

SMOOT FORECASTS ACTION OF CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 14.—United States Senator Smoot of Utah, who is generally regarded as voicing the attitude of the "regulars" in the senate, in a statement declares that no anti-trust, Alaskan or currency legislation may be expected at the coming session of congress.

After a conference with President Taft yesterday Senator Smoot declared that any trust legislation acted upon by the senate must be absolutely complete solution of the trust problem.

"The disposition of the tariff legislation will occupy nearly all of the time during the coming session," he said, "if any time is left free after the routine, the appropriation measures must be put out of the way, we will hardly be able to reach currency legislation. That, and the Alaskan legislation, will go into the next session."

DISEASED FRUIT TREES SEIZED

Goods Shipped to Sison From This State Are Found Infected by Officer—Comes to This City to Consult Professor O'Gara.

Joseph Wetzell, state horticultural commissioner and quarantine officer, of Yreka, was in Medford Saturday to consult Professor O'Gara about 200 young fruit trees which he has just confiscated at Sison. They had been received at the postoffice there, consigned to W. B. Hunt, agent for the Capital City nursery, of Salem, Ore. The trees were sold to people in that vicinity. The commissioner had discovered that the trees were infected with diseases known as root knot and crown gall, hence the raid and confiscation of the consignment, which is to be destroyed at once.

Quite a number of shipments were made to different parts of Siskiyou county by the Salem firm, all coming within the past few days. Besides the shipment that has been taken, the commissioner has confiscated 300 trees shipped to Montague, 300 at Yreka, 75 at Edgewood and 100 at Gazelle, all infected with the same diseases.

A peculiar feature of the shipment of trees from the Salem nursery is the fact that they were all labeled as having passed the inspection of R. Schneider, a deputy horticultural commissioner in the first district of Oregon.
