FAST GAME HERE ON SATURDAY

Eugene and Medford Will Clash on Local Gridiron Next Saturday and From Present Indications Game Will Be Bitterly Contested.

When the Eugene high school football team marches on to the local field next Saturday a battle royal may be expected. From all accounts Eugene has a very strong team and past performances have proven that there is no better team than Medford in southern Oregon.

Last Saturday Eugene defeated McMinnville, 28 to 6, and half of the game, including the time when McMinnville's score was made, was played with second team men. From all accounts of the game the playing of Wagers and Gray in the backfield on offensive work was a feature and the Medford boys will do well to watch these two. Gray is the punter for Eugene and easily outplayed McMinnville 15 to 20 yards on each exchange. Holden, Fox and Vickers are touted as being stars in the line.

With the forward pass Eugene was unable to gain against McMinnville, and after the first quarter, they worked Gray at the opposing guards and tackles with an occasional end run by Wagers.

With a week to practice and the chance that many plays were not tried on McMinnville, this dope from Eugene's camp may mean "but little. Medford learned more in the last Ashland game than has been drilled into the team all season and the manner in which the boys are practicing for the Eugene game proves them plucky losers and made of the stuff to win. There is an even chance that the local boys will get away with the game and if they do they will earn a reputation in the state.
