WOOLGROWERS WILL DEMAND NEW LAW

BAKER, Ore., Nov. 16.—Determined to co-operate in the campaign of the Oregon Wool Growers' Association to secure the enactment of legislation that will assure the wool user the same protection as the pure food law does the purchaser of foods, delegates to the Wool Growers' convention left for their homes today.

Shortly before adjournment the convention passed a resolution declaring for government inspection of woolen manufactured goods and the labeling of goods containing shoddy and wool. The next convention will be held at Vale, Ore.
