

POULTRY MAN VISITS MEDFORD

Representative of Firm Which Ships Huge Quantities of Eggs to This City Surprised at Growth Medford Has Made.

Joseph Bridges of the Oakland (Oregon) firm of Bridges Brothers, was a business visitor in Medford yesterday and expressed himself as surprised at the growth of Medford. Mr. Bridges says Oakland is the Pacific northwest in the poultry business what Medford represents in the fruit raising industry. Oakland ships more poultry and poultry products than any other Pacific coast city with the exception of Petaluma, Cal. Mr. Bridges' firm shipping 1200 dozen of eggs to Medford alone during the past three weeks.

SECOND SENSATIONAL SUICIDE SUCCEEDS

SANTA ROSA, Cal., Nov. 16.—The sensational suicide of Mrs. Minerva Belle Leppo, wife of Frank Leppo, a prominent Santa Rosa business man, is revealed here today in that of her cousin, Assistant Cashier W. Thomas Hopper of the Santa Rosa Bank, which followed closely upon a conference of the bank officials at which he is alleged to have been accused of writing a note to the employers of Mrs. Doris Lincoln, a widow, whose name was connected with that of Frank Leppo, and who was ostracized by society women of Santa Rosa because of alleged responsibility for Mrs. Leppo's suicide.

After the conference with the officials at which Hopper protested his innocence, he went home, wrote his wife a note telling of his intention, kissed his 10-year-old daughter, sent the child with a note to her grand-parents, entered his bedroom, tested his revolver by firing one shot, placed a mirror on his bed and gazing into it, sent a bullet through his brain.

HOUSTON, Texas, Nov. 16.—United States Senator Williams of Mississippi was here yesterday to attend the wedding of his son, in spite of painful injuries received in a run-away accident. The senator was hurled violently to the roadway when his horses ran away while leaving his home in Yazoo City. He was badly lacerated about the hands and face.

MINERS' CABINS BEING ROBBED

Horace Stevens Loses Over \$100 Worth of Personal Effects—Be-hooves Miners to Keep Their Eyes Open for Visitation of Thieves.

That owners of well-supplied cabins in the mountains should be on the lookout for marauders is evident from several recent experiences reported from the Siskiyou range south of Waldo.

Horace Stevens, who is interested in a group of quartz claims in the Preston Peak region, says that within the past ten days his cabin was raided during his absence and about everything it contained of value was taken to parts unknown.

"From the free-handed manner in which the thieves operated," said Stevens, "a person would suppose that I had given a pollack."

"My loss will aggregate more than \$100, and includes a 7x7 six and cotton tent, an Eastman 5x7 folding target kodak, a dozen No 3 double-spring Newhouse steel straps, a heavy piece of new 8x15 foot canvas, practically all my tools, besides provisions, ammunition and other articles of minor importance. They even took my razor, tortoise shell comb and a tooth brush, although just why they made away with the latter is a matter of conjecture.

"In view of the circumstances, it strikes me that some gang has gone into this mining cabin thieving business on an extensive scale and it behooves miners to keep their weather eye open for visitations of this character."
