

MRS PATTERSON ON TRIAL SOON

Woman Who Killed Husband Will Testify That She Was Sold by Him to a Chicago Man—Writing Her Biography.

DENVER, Col., Nov. 18.—Mrs. Gertrude Patterson, charged with the murder of her husband, will be put on trial here next Monday. She has just completed her autobiography, on which she has been working since she was committed to jail. It refers particularly to her life with Emil Strauss, the rich Chicago clothing merchant, to whom she alleges, her husband sold her for \$1,500.

In the book Mrs. Patterson tells how, after she went to Europe with Strauss, with consent of her husband, Patterson called the clothier that he must have more money or he would bring suit that would expose the whole affair.

Strauss sent Mrs. Patterson back to her husband with \$5,000. She lived with him until his cruel treatment started the quarrel which resulted in his death.

Then will the fruit reach the perfection which the Great Gardener intended. Spray your heart, cut off the dead branches, chop off the warts and bumps and needless growths of fungus. Then will you become fruitful trees."

While \$200,000 has been paid to the government for water rights and various other charges, farm mortgages for this purpose do not exceed \$300. During the last three years, real estate values on this government enterprise, it is estimated, have increased from 50 to 100 per cent work.
