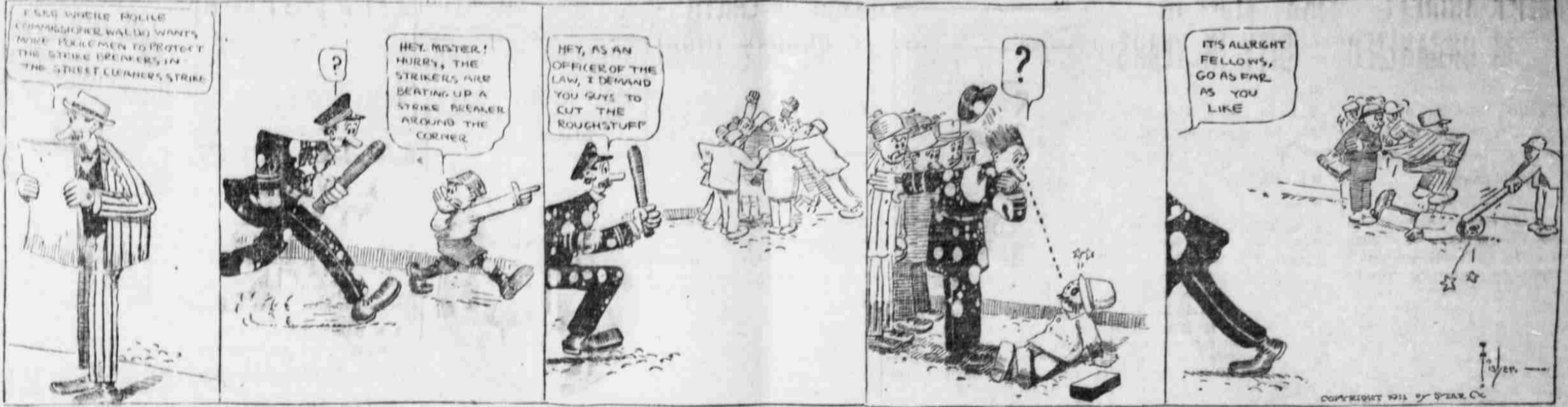


Lucky for Jeff That Mutt Was Not a Regular Policeman

WANT FRUIT COLOR PLATES

Charles Malhoef Asks Assistance in Securing From Washington an Appropriation for Publishing of Book on Fruits in United States.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Ore., Nov. 21. Prof. C. I. Lewis, head of the division of horticulture at the Oregon Agricultural college, has just received a letter from C. A. Malhoef of the Northwestern Fruit exchange, asking for the assistance of the college in a movement which has commercial clubs, chambers of commerce and fruit growers of the north-west are backing. The plan is to secure from the government an appropriation for the publication in one volume of the thousands of fine color plates of varieties of fruits grown throughout the United States.

Not only the Northwestern Fruit exchange, but the Portland Commercial club, the Oregon Development league, the Seattle Commercial club, the Tacoma chamber of commerce and the Boise, Idaho, Commercial club are all actively interested in this movement. Mr. Malhoef has also written Mr. Leonard Carpenter, secretary of the Oregon Experiment league, asking his assistance in enlisting the interest of the members of the league in the proposed legislation. It is planned to have those interested write to the senators and representatives in congress asking them to support a bill which will be introduced regarding the proposed publication.

The pomological department of the bureau of plant industry at Washington has at the present time on hand 3,000 colored plates of apples and other domestic fruits, and with these they have a full and accurate description of each variety. Owing to lack of funds they have been unable to publish these, though there are a few in each of the government year books of the bureau. Any one can get an idea of the nature of these plates by looking in the past year books. If the department had the money to publish them and have them properly bound and distributed to the fruit growers it would be a vast benefit to the improvement of fruit growing all over the country. For instance, it would enable the Pacific coast growers, as well as those of other parts of the United States, to compare the varieties as grown in different districts. If a variety in one part of the country does not size, it would be evident that it was not the district for it.

Ostrich Ranch Sold. LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 21.—For a consideration of about \$1,250,000 a syndicate of Los Angeles bankers have bought the Cawston ostrich farm from Edwin Cawston, originator of the enterprise of breeding ostriches in this country. The South Pasadena and San Jacinto establishments contain more than 1200 birds and the farm was 25 years old today. So successful was Cawston that 21 other farms have been established, all modeled after his South Pasadena place.

CO-EDS RALLY TO WILSON CAUSE

Twelve Girls at Stanford Join College Men's Woodrow Wilson League—One of Them Is Elected Vice President of Organization.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Nov. 21.—Twelve fair "co-eds" at Stanford are today admitted to membership in the National Woodrow Wilson league of college men, at a meeting held on the Stanford campus. The supporters of the candidacy of Woodrow Wilson for the presidency met and laid aside their books long enough to organize a Wilson club as a branch of the National League of College Men now formed in the universities throughout the country by the adherents of Governor Wilson.

The by-laws of the Stanford club, which provide for a membership of "men only," had to be stretched when 13 suffragettes appeared at the meeting called to launch the club and demanded to be admitted. Since the ballot was put into the hands of California women the Stanford "co-eds" determined to storm the meeting and see if they were really as democratic as they professed. They won out.

Then, just to show the feminine division that there was no "frost," the male section of the club elected to the office of vice president Miss Edith Mary Smith, a German "major" from Fresno. Miss Smith is an active member of the Stanford Women's league and gives promise of setting a hot pace for the men workers of the organization.
