

RICH PLACER IS TO BE DEVELOPED

L. H. Willett Tells of Plans of Kansas City Men Who Recently Purchased the Barr Holdings on Briggs Creek.

GRANT PASS, Nov. 22.—L. H. Willett, of Medford, manager of the Congar Consolidated Mines, with headquarters at Gallego, was in Grants Pass Saturday on business for his company. This is a company of Kansas City men who recently purchased the Barr placer on Briggs creek, and the superintendent for the new owners is Nod Heath, of Goldfield, Nev. The holdings consist of 16 placer claims, and is cut throughout the length of the Consolidated claims by Briggs creek, which furnishes ample water for successful mining. While only a small area of the acreage was opened by the former owner, yet the ground has yielded many fine nuggets and much coarse gold. Moore brothers operated it under lease last winter, and this season sought a renewal of the lease, but the sale prevented.

The new owners are arranging to equip the property with an electric light plant, and saw mill, new flume system, grinders, and considerable new 15 inch pipe. Day and night shifts will be the program.

Manager Willett stated that machinery of the latest design in placer mining will be installed, something entirely new in placer work.

I. W. W. MAY SOON DESCEND ON SALEM

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 22.—Salem will be the next point of attack by the Industrial Workers of the World if the threats of W. E. Clark, an Industrial agitator, are carried into effect.

After Clark had been convicted of disturbing the open-air meetings of the Salton Army meetings here and sentenced to twenty-five days in jail or a \$50 fine, he declared that 100 Industrialists would come to Salem and make the "officers regret his arrest" unless he was released. He has not been liberated.

Miller Is Not Candidate.

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 22.—I am positively not a candidate for secretary of state, nor will I become one in the campaign next year," said Frank J. Miller, member of the state railroad commission, today. "This is final with me. I have been elected as a member of the state railroad commission and intend to complete my term as such, and I do not believe it correct or proper for the holder of an elective office to seek for other offices during the middle of his term."

Commissioner Miller has been approached from many quarters of the state to become a candidate to succeed Secretary Olcott.

Seats on Sale for Fight.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 22.—With the prices ranging from \$5 to \$20, the seats for the Wolgast-Welsh fight on Thanksgiving day were placed on sale here today. The advance sale indicates that a record-breaking crowd will be present when "Frisco Jack" Welsh sends the two little scrappers on their twenty-second journey.

No betting has yet been reported, but it seems likely today that Wolgast will enter the ring a ten-to-six favorite.

Proven Grafter.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 22.—Detective Victor L. Marion, charged with grafting, was found guilty by a jury in the superior court late yesterday. Marion was charged with offering to secure dismissal of the case against J. W. Dalton, charged with abduction. He offered to bring influence with the district attorney's office. Sentence has not yet been imposed.

Financier Dead.

DENVER, Col., Nov. 22.—Charles B. Kountz, member of the famous family controlling national banks in Denver, Omaha and New York, and one of the richest men in the west, died at his home here this morning as the result of an attack of pneumonia. Kountz founded the Colorado National bank in 1864.

Divorce Case Postponed.

PARIS, Nov. 22.—Hearing of the divorce suit brought by Lina Cavalieri, the opera singer, against her husband, Sheriff "Bob" Chanler of Dutchess county, New York, which was to have begun today, has been postponed until Thursday.

NEW LICENSE IS REFUSED

Young and Hall Turned Down by City Council on Ground That Enough Saloons to Supply Medford Are Now in Operation.

The city council by a unanimous vote Tuesday evening adopted a report of the liquor license committee filed by Mayor Canon and W. J. Emmerick, which was unfavorable to the granting of a family liquor license to Young & Hall. Mayor Canon for the committee explained that the committee believed enough licenses were in effect now to supply Medford's needs.

A liquor license was granted the Rogue River Valley University club.

A license was also granted the Ran-Mohr company for their Fir street saloon. Councilman Wortman voting no, owing to the fact that a restaurant was no longer in operation in connection with the place.

Train Service Blocked.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Nov. 22.—This city and northwest Washington are still without train service and there is little prospect of resumption before tonight at the earliest, owing to the large number of washouts and slides from Sunday's floods.

STREET SPEAKERS MUST GO, THEY SAY

Portland Merchants Are Getting Tired of Nightly Harangues Going on on Sixth and Seventh Streets and May Take Action.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 22.—Declaring that their business is injured by the large crowds that congregate around the socialists and Industrial Workers of the World street speakers nightly on Sixth and Seventh streets, merchants who characterize the agitators as "anarchists" today announced that they will inaugurate a wholesale campaign against street speaking in the business thoroughfares immediately. Keenly resenting the epithets applied to them and their followers, leaders of both organizations stated today that they will make a determined fight and will test the right of their organizers to make street addresses in the courts, if necessary.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 22.—The beef packers' lawyers failed to appear before the United States supreme court today in the expected attempt to avoid going to trial in Chicago. As court adjourned this afternoon for two weeks, the packers have now no opportunity to obtain relief at this juncture of the case. So the trial, now before the United States district court in Chicago, will proceed.

AVIATOR DROPS BOMBS ON TURKS

Turks Are Repulsed on Three Attacks—Armored Cruisers Make Attack on Fort of Henni, Near Tripoli.

TRIPOLI, Nov. 22.—Repulses of Turks in three attacks on outposts of this city were reported by returning Italian soldiers. The number killed is given as 29.

Five aviators state that there is no change in the Turkish position. They succeeded in dropping bombs into the Turkish camp, destroying it.

Other reports are that the Italian armored cruiser Carlo Alberto bombarded the village of Amrus, and the fort of Henni, near Tripoli, and that the Turks attacked under cover of fog at Derna, but were repulsed.
