



Hazel Smith Betrays John Rogers and Police Claim That Goodman Jewelry.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 24.-Locating the inevitable woman in the case, detectives today declare they have irrefutable evidence that John Rogers murdered Benjamin A. Goodman, the young jewelry salesman whose body was found under a pile of refuse in a gutter here, robbed of \$5,000 worth of jewelry, Hazel Smith, Rogers' consort, betrayed him She led the officers to a nult in which half of the loot was hidden. Rogers has given a partial confession, but he maintains that he is innocent of murder.

One of the diamond rings taken from Goodman, the property of Benjamin T. Brilliant, the murdered man's employer, worn by the Smith woman, led to her arrest and subsequent confession. The rest of the recovered jewelry was found in a strong box in a Kearney street sa-






