

### CHIC BOWLIN HEARING TODAY

Assault Case, in Which Negro Pugilist is Defendant, Being Aired This Afternoon in the Justice's Court.

"Chic" Bowlin, who was arrested Wednesday charged with assaulting Charles Tschigri, a jury attorney of this city, was brought before Judge Glenn O. Taylor for trial, Prosecuting Attorney Mulkey appearing for the state and R. B. McCabe for the defendant.

The case was called at 11 o'clock and upon motion of the prosecuting attorney Judge Taylor is to sit in the case only as committing magistrate, and, as such, the judge can either bind Bowlin over to the grand jury or dismiss the case.

### SPANOS FORCED TO PAY BILLS

Greek Arrested, Charged With Attempting to Defraud His Customers—Attorneys Appeared Today and Paid His Bills for Him.

Mike Spanos was arrested last night at the instance of a member of the Merchants' association charged with being about to leave the state to avoid payment of creditors.

He was confined in the city jail last night, and this morning, in company with his attorney, De Avmond, appeared in Judge Taylor's court and paid the bills claimed to be owed by him to the member of the association.

### M'DAVIT IS FOUND GUILTY

Jury Only Out Fifty Minutes Before Returning a Verdict of Guilty—Judge Will Sentence Him Next Monday.

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Nov. 24.—After fifty minutes' deliberation the jury hearing the case of Dr. A. W. McDavit, charged with holding Miss Jessie McDonald a captive in a room adjoining his office, returned a verdict of guilty at 1:50 o'clock this afternoon. Judge Bledsoe will sentence the convicted man Monday.

### WOMAN FIGURES IN FRISCO CASE

Hazel Smith Betrays John Rogers and Police Claim That Goodman Was Murdered by Him for His Jewelry.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 24.—Locating the inevitable woman in the case, detectives today declare they have irrefutable evidence that John Rogers murdered Benjamin A. Goodman, the young jewelry salesman whose body was found under a pile of refuse in a gutter here, robbed of \$5,000 worth of jewelry. Hazel Smith, Rogers' consort, betrayed him. She led the officers to a vault in which half of the loot was hidden. Rogers has given a partial confession, but he maintains that he is innocent of murder.

One of the diamond rings taken from Goodman, the property of Benjamin T. Brilliant, the murdered man's employer, worn by the Smith woman, led to her arrest and subsequent confession. The rest of the recovered jewelry was found in a strong box in a Kearney street saloon.

Rogers declared the jewels were given him by young Fruttini, also employed where Rogers worked. Fruttini, confronting Rogers, told him he lied. Rogers broke down completely today and cried hysterically that he is a victim of police persecution.

### PAST RISES TO CONFRONT WOMAN

Mrs. Gertrude Patterson is Declared to be Gertrude Knight, Who Was Formerly Proprietor of a Resort in St. Louis.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 24.—Declaring that Mrs. Gertrude Patterson, on trial in Denver, Col., for the murder of her husband, and Gertrude Knight, former proprietor of a resort in the St. Louis tenderloin, are one and the same person, Chief of Police Young of this city today forwarded to Denver statements which may prove overwhelmingly against the woman in her fight for life.

Thomas Mahon, formerly head of the morality squad here, identified a Bertillon photo of Mrs. Patterson as the Knight woman, whom he knew well from 1900 to 1904. May Brown, a former associate, also identified this photograph.

A record of the case of Edward Alexander, who in August, 1901, was found dead in the Knight house, and whose autopsy showed traces of morphine poisoning, was also sent to Denver. May Cupples, an inmate of the resort, was indicted at the time on a charge of assisting Alexander's suicide, but was acquitted. Gertrude Knight was one of the principal witnesses in the case.

know nothing about the case. Don't drag me down again. Beulah Binford is dead. I have been given a chance to save myself; I have a good position, a good home, and all I ask now is that I be left alone. The only real friends I ever had are taking care of me.

"I was the victim in the Beattie case. They picked me out of a dozen others who were Beattie's victims and they made me the cause of his crime, because I was helpless and had nobody to protect me. I was Beattie's cast-off. If they would have taken his other victims there would have been scandal. I pity Beattie, but he did nothing good for me, and he turned me away when he was tired of me. I forgive him though, and I only pray that the past be blotted out."

Washington is known here as the "back haul case." It was filed by the transportation committee of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, the transportation bureau of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce and the Tacoma Traffic association in 1909.

The complainants asserted that the distributive through rates into Oregon, Montana, Washington and Idaho were discriminatory and unduly high.

Attorneys who participated in the case said they did not believe that the United States commerce court would grant the railroads an injunction in this case as was done in the Spokane rate case recently. It is expected that the distributive areas of Seattle, Tacoma and Portland will be broadened considerably as a result of the decision, provided it becomes effective.

### Family Asphyxiated.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 24.—Mrs. L. R. Ware, formerly of San Mateo, Cal., and her two boys, 5 and 7 years old, were found dead from asphyxiation in their home here today.

Mrs. Ware's husband is said to be traveling in Europe. Faulty plumbing is believed to be responsible.

LINCOLN CENTER, Kan., Nov. 24.—Attacking the character of Miss Mary Chamberlain is the method by which A. N. Simms, John Schmidt and Sheriff Clark expect to justify their action in tarring and feathering her, at their trial here today.

The trial was resumed with Simms on the stand. Schmidt and Clark are expected to follow.

Miss Chamberlain appeared in the court room today pale and nervous as a reaction from the ordeal of yesterday, through which she bore up without a sign of agitation while telling her story of the tarring outrage.
