

STREET FRAGAS ATTRACTS MANY

George Mansfield, While Intoxicated Stirs Up Rumpus in Neighborhood of Jack Johnson's Boothblack Stand—Canon Endeavors for Peace.

Maintaining that it is "no crime to kill a nigger," George Mansfield, a newcomer in this city from Redlands, Cal., created considerable excitement while intoxicated Friday evening in the neighborhood of Jack Johnson's boothblack stand on Central avenue, which was only ended when Mansfield was lodged in the city jail. During the fracas Mayor Canon, who attempted to enforce order, was assaulted. Peace was restored when Officer Cingcade appeared on the scene and bore the belligerent off to jail, accompanied by Mansfield's brother, William, and his wife. Mayor Canon was roughly handled during the mixup but was not injured, Mansfield shoving him about but not striking him. The possibilities of a serious tragedy were augmented by the fact that Mansfield had a .38 Colt's revolver in his pocket which he kept referring to and handling. Mansfield will be given a hearing Monday.

Mansfield's condition was first noticed about 5:30 o'clock by Frankie Edwards, the athletic instructor at the Natatorium gymnasium, when, minus a hat, Mansfield drove up to the Nash hotel and informed him that he meant to go around on Central avenue and "kill a nigger." On arriving at Johnson's boothblack stand Edwards tried to calm Mansfield, when the latter's wife and brother showed up on the scene, having followed him. Their appearance riled Mansfield again and he started to raise rough house when Mayor Canon arrived. The mayor endeavored to quell the noise and was assaulted by Mansfield. Officer Cingcade took the man to the city jail, where he remained until 11 o'clock. His brother was locked up but soon released. Mrs. Mansfield refused to leave her husband, remaining at the jail.

Mansfield with his family came here a few weeks ago. He is said to be considering an investment in the valley, being a man of considerable means, and to have properly conducted himself at all times until yesterday. He has made many friends here.

GOLD HILL BANK BIDS IN MINE

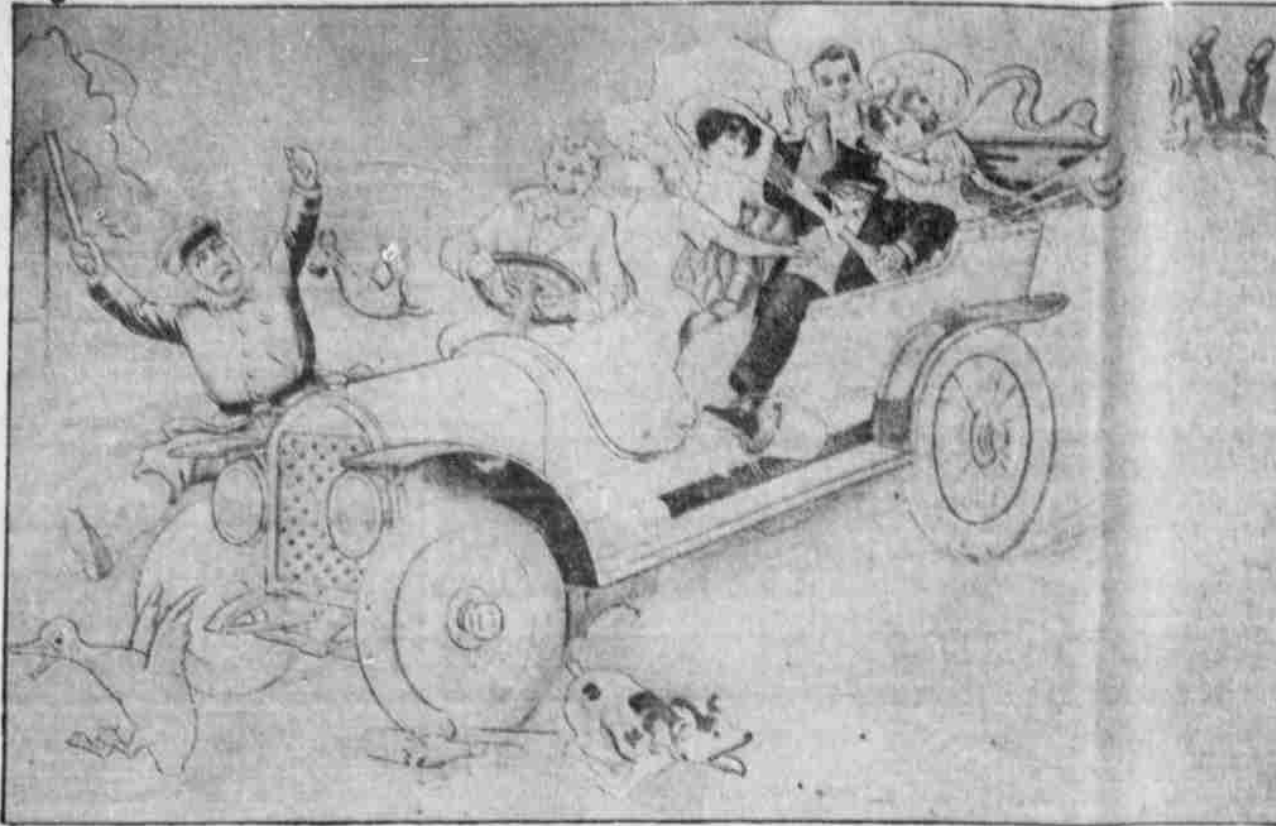

SCENE FROM CHARLES KLEIN'S "THE THIRD DEGREE," AT THE OPERA HOUSE SATURDAY EVENING.



The approach of Charles Klein's great drama, "The Third Degree," which is to appear here on Saturday, November 25th, may bring with it some conjecture as to the meaning of the title.

Not all theatergoers are familiar, through one source or another, with conditions as they exist in certain police circles, nor are they acquainted with the evils of a much-used system of preliminary inquiry too frequently employed by the police in questioning a suspected person. This system is known as "The Third Degree." The more modern idea of the third degree constitutes a long, trying series of questions with or without some form of physical torture, but never without some mental shock or discomfort.

The third degree as used in the

Sixteenth century was worked only by means of physical horror and torture, and was known as "the Spanish Inquisition." This soon gave way under the opposing attack of certain European powers, and was abolished. Later, in France, a crime was enacted, as it was supposed to have been committed, before the suspect, which necessarily called for the many gruesome spectacles without any real assurance of a correct "confession." This system of playing crime was known as "The Reconstruction," and is still in vogue in France, though in milder form.

The name, the third degree, as applied to the present form of inquiry is a phrase given to a "sweating" ordeal which was given a newspaper review of the event by a "police reporter." No one, even the reporter himself, could tell just why the phrase was applied to the system, but it won instant favor among his fellow newspaper men, until now it is a term that has an international significance.
