BRUTE BADLY BEATS HIS WIFE

Couple Who Recently Went to Eugene From This City in the Limelight—Man Escapes, Woman Nearly Famed.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 29.—Attracted by the screams of a woman issuing from a room in the Matlock lodging house, casual passersby paused for a moment and then, acting on a common impulse, rushed up the back stairway. They found Fred Weber in the act of beating his wife. The couple recently came from Medford.

Hearing a clatter of many shoes with sturdy feet in them coming down the hall in his direction, the wife heater desisted from his brutal pastime and fled down the front stairway. The assault occurred at 10 o'clock, and at last accounts the fellow was at large. Luckily, he did not fall into the hands of the mob which had collected around the building, for there were many threats made of dealing out summary justice.

Patrolman Morris responded to the hurrup-call, but the quarry had made good his escape. There were evidences of a desperate struggle in the room. A pane of glass had been broken out of the window and this precious specimen of lord and miser had broken a bottle of whisky while dealing out nocturnal chastisement to his helpmeet.

The woman told a pitiful tale of neglect, cruelty and abuse heaped upon her by Weber, while a 3-year-old child wept with the passionate abandon of babyhood. The woman's face bore the marks of the man's cruel fists and she was weak from lack of nourishing food.
