The assault occurred at 10 o'clock, and at last accounts the fellow was at large. Luckily, he did not fall into the hands of the mob which had collected around the building, for there were many threats made of dealing out summary justice.

Patrolman Morris responded to the hurr-up call, but the quarry had made good his escape. There were evidences of a desperate struggle in the room. A pane of glass had been broken out of the window and this precious specimen of lord and master had broken a bottle of whisky while dealing out nocturnal chastisement to his helpmeet.
