

# RUSSIA SENDING TROOPS TO FORCE PERSIA TO YIELD

W. Morgan Shuster Must Go, Say Powers—Will Not Tolerate American as Financial Treasurer for the Shah.

## BELIEVE RUSSIA AND ENGLAND WILL SEIZE LAND

Shuster May Not Quit Country, But Remain in an Advisory Position.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 1.—Russia today ordered an advance of troops to the Persian frontier, indicating that it intends to force upon Persia an immediate acceptance of its ultimatum involving the expulsion of W. Morgan Shuster, American financial treasurer of the shah's monarchy.

TEHERNA, Persia, Dec. 1.—Opposed in his schemes for the reorganization of Persia by both English and Russian agents, W. Morgan Shuster, American treasurer general of Persia, today presented his resignation.

Shuster laid down his thankless task following a refusal by the Persian parliament to expel him from the country on the united demands of Great Britain and Russia. He believes that England and Russia have determined upon the partition of Persia, and that he could not reorganize the finances of the country effectively against such powerful opposition.

It is not yet stated whether Shuster will quit the country or whether he will remain in an advisory capacity to the Persian cabinet.

Shuster, when interviewed by the United Press today, said:

"Russia's demand for my dismissal as treasurer general of Persia is actuated by my refusal to officially recognize Russia's sphere of influence in northern Persia. If I had acceded to the czar's demand I would have betrayed the Persian people. The unexpected repulse of the old shah in attempting to regain his throne and the solidarity of the constitutional government have further embittered the Russian bureaucracy. "If the Persians wish to submit to Russian dictation they must get a new treasurer general. Russia for years has been intimidating Persian officials, and Russia is wild now because Persia has secured an American who won't submit. The czar of Russia never intended to permit real financial reform in Persia, but he was forced to show his hand sooner than he expected.

"England has sanctioned the attack upon me, but I challenge both England and Russia to show any act of mine opposing legitimate foreign interests. I offer no apology for my conduct."

## MAY INVITE ELK CHIEFTAIN HERE

Local Members of B. P. O. E. Much Interested in Visit of Exalted Ruler, Who Will Be in Portland Next Week.

Local members of the B. P. O. Elks are taking much interest in the proposed visit of Grand Exalted Ruler Sullivan at Portland next week and may endeavor to have him visit Medford before returning east.

John P. Sullivan—his middle name is Patrick—is the biggest man in all Elksdom, and the idol of 400,000 of his fellow lodgemen. Sullivan is big in more ways than one. 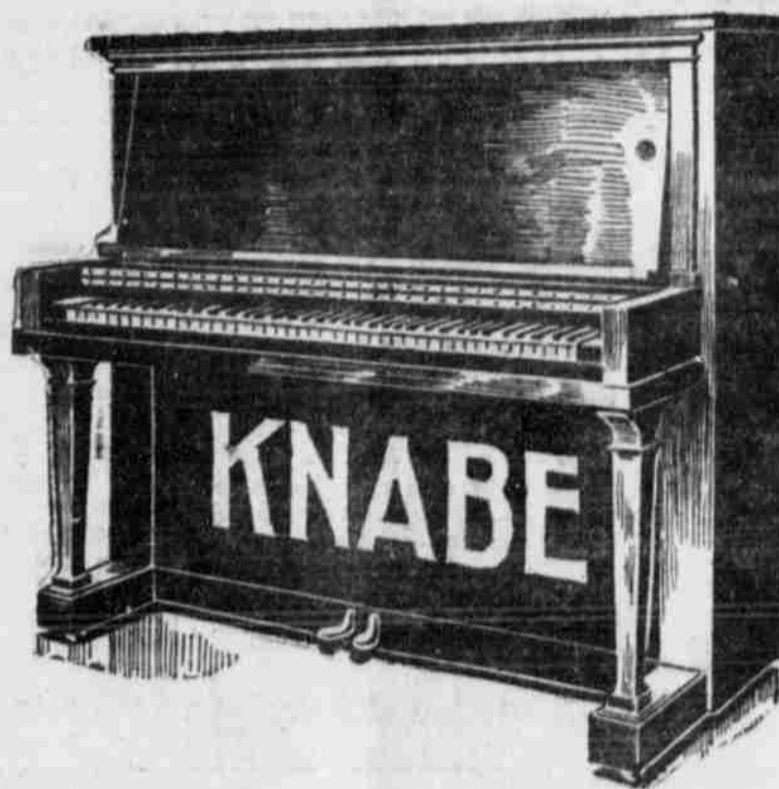
