

THIS NOVEMBER WAS DRIEST FOR ELEVEN YEARS

During Month Just Passed Rainfall Only Totaled 1.67 Inches, Which is Far Below the Average, or 4.21 Inches.

THIS NOVEMBER WAS REMARKABLE FOR WEATHER

Two Inches of Snow Fell During the Month—Ten Clear Days.

According to the monthly report of P. J. O'Garra, special meteorological observer, United States weather bureau, November, just closed, was the driest since 1900, when 1.45 inches was recorded.

The precipitation for November was 1.67 inches, and is much below the average for the past twenty-three years, which is 4.21 inches.

The lowest record for any November since 1890 was 1.18 inches, recorded in 1890.

The greatest November precipitation was in 1903, when a record of 10.64 inches was made.

However, the past November has been remarkable for its fine weather, with sufficient precipitation for fall plowing and for crops, such as winter oats, wheat and vetch.

PACKEY'S WICKED RIGHT STAYED?

Fight Fans Wonder Why He Didn't Put Murphy Out—New Contender for Lightweight Championship Seen in Willie Ritchie.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 2.—Disappointed fight fans who are wondering why Packey McFarland, the Chicago lightweight, after outpointing "Harlem Tommy" Murphy of New York, allowed him to stay the full limit of twenty rounds in their Thanksgiving battle here, are confronted with three questions today: Couldn't Packey knock him out; wouldn't he, or did he, as he claims, enter the ring with nerves upset by the California climate and the illness of Champion Wolgast, and injured his wrist in the thirteenth round?

The fact remains that Packey showed no signs of a knockout punch during the contest. Many believe that he was thinking of future fights with Freddie Welsh, Matt Wells and Ad Wolgast, and deliberately stayed his wicked right.

"The worst I should have received was a draw," mourns Murphy. "My showing in the last six rounds, when I chased Packey around the ring and landed two telling blows to his nose, entitles me to that. I do not think Packey has gone back since I met him before, but that I am getting better all the time. I can beat him in a finish fight. I could have gone fifteen rounds more at that pace, and Packey was tired."

Ritchie a Surprise. LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 2.—A new contender for the lightweight throne is seen here today in Willie Ritchie of San Francisco, who entered the ring on twenty-four hours' notice at Vernon Thursday afternoon and fought Freddie Welsh to a standstill.

Untrained and in every way unprepared for an engagement, Ritchie, who arrived from San Francisco less than six hours before the bout, made a remarkable showing, and in the last three rounds Welsh, who had been groomed for a world's championship battle, hanging on to avoid a knockout. More than half of the 3,000 spectators who witnessed Thursday's bout are convinced that a draw would have been a fairer decision and hundreds believe that Ritchie was clearly entitled to the decision.
