GREAT CROWD AT CHICAGO LAND SHOW

The attendance, including Sunday, amounted to 120,471, equal to about 70 per cent of the total admission to the Coliseum, and 45,000 more people than attended in the two weeks in the lecture rooms last year.

French Breakfast Rolls (Recipe by Mrs. Sara Tyson Rorer) One pint milk, two ounces Cottolene; one teaspoonful salt; one pound flour; one egg; one-half cup yeast, or one-half cake yeast dissolved. Scald the milk and cut into it the Cottolene, add salt, and when cool sift in the flour; add a well-beaten egg and the yeast. Beat well and stand in a warm place over night. In the morning form into little rolls, handling as little as possible, adding a very little flour. Place each roll in a French roll pan, stand in warm place three-quarters of an hour and bake in quick oven about fifteen minutes. Everyone likes these light, puffy rolls; Cottolene gives just as fine results as if you used butter, and at less expense.

WANTS CENTRAL SELLING AGENCY

Twelve Districts in Northwest Have Been Established—Jackson and Josephine Counties Constitute District No. 1.

In an effort to unite the Pacific northwest into a central organization for the sale of apples, the promoters of the Central Fruit Marketing exchange have established twelve districts, in which is expected to be included all the apples of the four states. While dubious that such a large organization can be made sufficiently yielding to enable the promoters to do justice to each and every district, sentiment in favor of the plan is increasing. The fact that the exchange would classify the fruit of the better known districts with sections not so well known, and for which product the public will not pay high prices, is expected to cause much dissatisfaction. The proposed districts are as follows: District 1—Southern Oregon—Jackson and Josephine counties. District 2—Willamette valley—Douglas, Lane, Benton, Linn, Marion, Polk, Yamhill, Clackamas, Multnomah, Washington and Columbia counties. District 3—Lower Columbia—Hood River, Wasco, Sherman and Kiekiak counties. District 4—Yakima—Yakima, Kittitas and Benton counties. District 5—Wenatchee—Chelan, Okanogan and Douglas counties. District 6—Inland Empire—Spokane, Stevens, Kootenai and upper Whitman counties. District 7—Snake river—Latah, Nez Perce, lower Whitman, Asotin and Garfield counties. District 8—Southern Idaho—Washington, Boise, Elmore, Ada, Canyon and Malheur counties. District 9—Eastern Oregon—Union and Baker counties. District 10—Walla Walla—Walla Walla, Columbia and Umatilla counties. District 11—Mojave. District 12—Western Washington.
