

### DEFENSE FUND TOTALLED \$400,000

Over \$170,000 Was Collected Through the Iron Workers—Frank Morrison Shows How the Vast Sum Was Distributed.

CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 6.—Something more than \$400,000 was raised by the labor unions of the country for the defense of the McNamara brothers. It is estimated here today, \$170,000 of which was collected through the International Association of Bridge and Structural Ironworkers.

Frank Morrison, secretary-treasurer of the American Federation of Labor and custodian of the McNamara defense fund, declared that Clarence Darrow received at least \$50,000 as his fee. Morrison's statement shows that the fund was distributed as follows:

Clarence S. Darrow, \$170,000; Leo M. Rappoport, Indianapolis attorney \$8,000; Henry Seyfried, Indianapolis attorney, \$2,500; Frank L. Mulford, Toledo attorney, \$259.10; for McNamara buttons, \$1,210; printing McNamara stamps, \$108.98; representatives visiting conventions and meetings, \$191; printing and mailing literature, \$1,133.15; postage, \$380; expense incurred relative to McNamara films, \$520.20; total \$181,858.93.

### AFTER MONEY FOR YOSEMITE

CAPITOL, SACRAMENTO, Cal., Dec. 6.—Assemblyman Clark today introduced a joint resolution memorializing congress to appropriate \$1,000,000 for the further improvement of the Yosemite National park, the expenditure to be \$250,000 annually for four years. The resolution was proposed at the instance of the Sierra club.

### JOHN D. AND GATES INVITED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 6.—John D. Rockefeller and his philanthropic, Rev. F. T. Gates, were formally presented with an opportunity to tell their side of the sensational stories of the Merritt brothers, when Chairman Stanley of the house steel trust investigating committee forwarded them invitations to do so today. The committee will resume its hearings next Monday.

### BUILDING FALLS; THREE KILLED

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 6.—Three persons are known to be dead and a score injured—six seriously—as the result of the collapse of a new three-story concrete building erected by the Prest-o-Lite company here today. Ten others still remain unaccounted for.

### ARRESTED CHARGED WITH STEALING RUG

Joe Perry was arrested yesterday upon complaint sworn out by Bert Anderson charged with the larceny of a large rug from a building at the rear of Mr. Anderson's house.

Perry is a garbage gatherer and in his rounds he gathered in the aforesaid rug and sold it to a second-hand dealer at so such a ridiculously low price that the dealer became suspicious and notified the police and the arrest followed.

Perry was brought before Judge Glenn O. Taylor and after the testimony of witnesses had been taken and the rug identified by Mr. Anderson as his property the culprit was fined \$25 and costs, amounting to \$31, which he paid.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 6.—Reductions in wool, cotton, iron, steel, sugar, agricultural implements and food schedules were practically decided upon at a meeting of the Democratic ways and means committee of the house here today to be placed on the tariff program for the present session.

### SEVERE BLOW IS DEALT SOCIALISM

Supreme Court Declares Its Choicest Ideas Illegal and Throws a Number of Its Officials in Milwaukee Out of Office.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 6.—The socialist administration here is suffering from the severest blow of its 18 months of life today as a result of the decision of the supreme court in declaring its choicest ideas illegal, throwing a number of its officials out of office and stopping the administration's effort to collect a \$15 car license fee for ten years, from which it was expected to derive \$200,000.

The city treasurer and city controller are in a predicament as they are probably personally responsible for the salaries paid the ousted officials, as well as the money spent under their direction.

### MINING ENGINEER TAKES A FALL

Ned Heath, a mining engineer employed on the Barr group of placer mines below Grants Pass, was severely injured Saturday when a scaffold on which he was working gave way. Heath fell 20 feet and sustained severe injuries. He is being treated at Grants Pass.

### KING STREET WILL REMAIN CLOSED

The city council declined to take action on Tuesday evening regarding the opening of King street as petitioned by residents of that neighborhood owing to the present state of the city finances.

Councilman Millar again brought before the council the matter of cutting the rate for paving on Grape street, but no action was taken.
