The regular examination of applicants for teachers' certificates will be held at Jacksonville, Oregon, commencing Wednesday, December 20th, 1911, as follows: Wednesday Forenoon—Writing, U. S. history, physiology. Wednesday Afternoon—Physical geography, reading, composition, methods in reading, methods in arithmetic. Thursday Forenoon—Arithmetic, civil government, history of education, psychology, methods in geography. Thursday Afternoon—Grammar, geography, American literature, physics, methods in language, thesis for primary certificate. Friday Forenoon—Theory, practice of teaching, orthography, English literature. Friday Afternoon—School law, botany, algebra. Saturday Forenoon—Geometry, geology. Saturday Afternoon—General history, bookkeeping.
