IRRIGATION IS THEME. (Continued from Page 1) yields where irrigation was practiced. Both the tomato and cucumber will bring thousands of dollars into the valley, as it is a certainty that a cannery and pickling factory will be established here by some of the large concerns in this business. This office has already been visited by one of the representatives of the H. J. Heinz Co. of Pittsburg. Beans and onions will also give large re-

turns, and because of the fact that they may be stored, they have an added value. I have mentioned only the four or five principle crops which may be grown on a large scale, but I do not hesitate in saying that many another crop, such as cabbage, lettuce, etc., could have a large place in our irrigation development. Today we are paying ten cents a head for lettuce. We could grow a fall lettuce superior to what we have shipped in from southern points.

"If there be any local prejudice against our own products, let it end soon, as the public will demand the products produced in the valley in preference to the inferior stuff brought in. Every dollar paid to the alien or foreigner, who grows the truck shipped into this valley, is practically lost. So far as we are concerned it has left us, and that means we are just one dollar poorer. There should be a certain co-operation that is to say, a reciprocity, between the farmer and the business man. Without this we must fail. I believe that the coming era of irrigation will have much to do in bringing all together so as to support a common interest, namely, the prosperity of the Rogue river valley.
