

ABROGATION OF TREATY DEMANDED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 13.—Immediate action by congress for the abrogation of Russia treaty of 1832 was demanded in the house today by Congressman Sulzer, of New York, as a result of Russia's action in refusing to honor passports of Jewish Americans.

Sulzer said in part: "For nearly half a century Russia has persistently refused to live up to the treaty and recognize the passports of American citizens without discrimination on account of race or color. We cannot tolerate this injustice; it is foreign to everything civilization stands for. This is not specifically a Jewish question—it is a question involving and affecting the rights and privileges of all American citizens. Russia not only refuses to recognize passports issued to Hebrews. She refuses to recognize passports in the hands of Baptist missionaries and Catholic priests. There can be no arbitration settlement to this elemental principle to our government. The matter must be settled definitely—once for all. A new treaty must be arranged. And that treaty must be one wherein Russia will find no loophole that will enable her to discriminate against any class of Americans."

RAP AT PRIMARIES WAS BIG BLUNDER

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 13.—According to dispatches from Washington published here this afternoon the majority of the republican national committeemen have admitted that a serious political blunder was made when the committee refused to accept Borah's proposition to favor primaries in states not having laws making primaries mandatory.

Ralph Williams, national committeeman from Oregon, is quoted as having said that he would be compelled to issue the call for Oregon regional committeemen in full recognition of the Oregon law which provides for the presidential primary. Progressives in Washington, it is stated, are already at work hampering Taft on the score that he refused to permit the committeemen to favor presidential primaries despite the fact that many of them personally desired to do so, but cast their own wishes aside on the orders of the administration.

LABOR OFFICIALS STILL MISSING

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 13.—The whereabouts of Olaf A. Tveitmo, president of the San Francisco labor council and Anton Johannsen, a fellow official, continues to puzzle the federal authorities. Nothing has been heard from Tveitmo since he left New York for the Pacific coast after attending the convention of the American Federation of Labor at Atlanta, Ga. It is alleged that he was closer to the McNamees than any of the other labor leaders in this section. Tveitmo, Johannsen and Mrs. David Caplan are the only witnesses of the 134 wanted who have not been located. Subpoenas have been served on the others.

Ball Men Meet.

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—Representatives of the American association and the International and Pacific Coast leagues met this afternoon with the National commission for the purpose of holding a general business session. It was announced that Buck Sharpe, formerly first baseman for the Pittsburgh Pirates, and later manager of the Buffalo team, has been formally appointed to manage the Oakland Coast league team, to succeed Manager Harry Wolverton.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Dec. 13.—Unofficial reports from 175 of the largest precincts out of a total of 280 assure the election of the entire democratic state ticket by not less than 3,500 votes out of a total of 23,000 cast.

Governor-elect Hunt has carried his own county—Gila—by approximately 500 majority and is now running neck and neck in Yavapai county, the home county of Ed. W. Wells, the republican nominee.

Henry Ashurst and Mark A. Smith, the democratic candidates for the United States senate, have defeated Ralph Cameron and Hoyal A. Smith, republicans, by approximately 3000 votes.
